ary 16, 2017 Azusa Mayor Joe Rocha delivered his 10th annual State of the City, with status presentations also by Dr. Jon Wallace, President for Azusa Pacific University; Arturo Ortega, Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services for Azusa Unified School District (Linda Kaminski, Superintendent was in Sacramento) and Ria Benbow, Board of Directors Chairwoman for the Azusa Chamber of Commerce. The ceremony was held at Azusa Pacific University's Upper Turner Campus Center. With the exception of Benbow, they all addressed efforts and accomplishments in 2016, as well as projected goals and financial challenges for the future.

Azusa Mayor Joe Rocha reported that Azusa had successfully managed to stay "out of the red" up to date despite the national economic downturn since 2008. He made reference and indicated full support for the City's new Police Chief, Steve Hunt. About one half of the Mayor's presentation dealt with

economic development and the balance of his presentation addressed quality of life issues benefitting all Azusa residents. He briefly addressed a summary of all development projects currently in progress, including but not limited to, the completion of the Intermodal Parking Structure, the completion and operation of the Gold Line, construction of Hilton Hotel and McDonald on

Azusa Avenue; mixed-use development projects at Block 36 (Foothill/Azusa); Block 37 (800 north of San Gabriel Blvd); Azusa and Ninth (across from Target); Dalton and Ninth Townhomes; Smart & Final at Foothill and Dalton; Lagunitas Brewing Company at Todd and Tenth; and multiple redevelopments near Costco, the corner of Alosta and Citrus, and along Alosta Avenue. Some of the quality of life issues addressed included prohibition of smoking in public property, prohibition of marijuana dispensaries, homelessness and associated mental problems, City of Azusa Scholarships and the availability of city website in 100 languages.

Dr. Wallace opened his remarks by stating that one of the

greatest things that unite APU with the city is the fact that all new and existing students must perform a certain amount of community work which if translated into a dollar amount it would be in the millions of dollars. He spoke with pride about the number of Azusa students receiving a \$5000.00 scholarship annually to the tune of nearly \$100,000 annually; each year five new students receive the scholarship. Lastly, he spoke about how the APU experience yields graduates that are prepared to go out into the world to help make it better or help others; he presented a video of one individual studying physical education in order to be able to help the youth live healthier.

Ortega spoke about the District has improved the engagement of parents, educators, staff, students, and the community to establish policy and improve education. He addressed the fact that the District addresses both state and district priorities and demonstrates how the budget achieves district goals and assessment outcomes. The district has increased English learners' academic language development, achievement, re-designation rate and decrease the number of Long-Term English learners and has increased all students' college and career readiness. Finally it has improved its district facilities, transportation and nutrition. He concluded his presentation with a slide presentation of colleges and universities where graduates have been accepted last summer.

Ms. Benbow didn't address any Chamber of Commerce accomplishments per say this year, with the exception of the collaboration with the Azusa Rotary Club in implementing the first annual Field of Glory event which consisted of the display of American flags on the front lawn of Azusa City Hall. A seven minute slide presentation of the Field of Glory was then presented.

BALDWIN PARK - The Regency Inn Motel at 14624 Dalewood St., in Baldwin Park is not very popular with residents in the area. It is full of AB 109 convicts who were released from jail without serving hardly any time. It was not uncommon to drive by the motel and see a large congregation of police cars and officers there doing felony parole sweeps.

The problematic Motel has seen a lot of issues over the years. The (new) owner's did what they could to cosmetically clean the place up.

The latest was a fire on the 3rd floor that injured nine people with some serious enough to be hospitalized. All were treated for smoke inhalation including one person who fell down while escaping the building.

The fire started just before 9:00 p.m., Sunday, February 19, and this turned into a two alarm fire. It was said that dozens of firefighters were on scene. Baldwin Park and West Covina Police assisted at the scene.

As the fire started, smoke alarms started going off on the 3rd and 4th floors. Those at the motel opened their door to the hall was met with a cloud of thick heavy smoke. Some residents could not see as they made their way to the stairs to get out of the building. The quick response held the main part of the fire to one room as firefighters searched all the other rooms to see if anyone was either trapped or afraid to come out of their rooms.

Most of the damage was to the top two floors with one room gutted and the room above heavily damaged by fire and smoke. Fire could be seen coming out of the building from the room of the building from the freeway. The fire was extinguished within thirty minutes, however firefighters stayed on scene throughout the night.

Residents were not allowed back into the building as it was "red tagged". It is unknown what caused the fire, it is still under investigation.

So the parolees will be out of the building and relocated elsewhere.



SB 75 Fix-Its for Prop 57

Sen. Patricia Bates (R-Laguna Nigel)) has written and introduced on January 10th Senate Bill 75 redefining "violent felonies" in the voter approved Prop 57 this past November election. Two of those mentioned in her press release are rape of an unconscious person and assault with a deadly weapon on a peace officer or firefighter along with a long list of other crimes the average citizen would find violent.

If you remember, Prop 57 provided:

· Enhancements would be eliminated so a felon convicted of 3 offenses would only serve time for 1 of those offenses. For example, person is picked up for possession of drugs, but is also a gang-banger and is in possession of a weapon. He/she would only serve time for one of those offenses with no additional time added on for the other two offenses.

· Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, in Prop 57 "shall have the authority" to award credits to the felon for good behavior and "approved rehabilitative or educational achievements". Those "credits" would lead to early release.

· A minor committing a criminal felony offense could be tried in adult rather than juvenile court upon the recommendation of the district attorney. Prop 57 provided for a report documenting the behavior and social history of the juvenile along with statements from the victims and the court would then make the decision where the juvenile offender would be tried – juvenile or adult court.

California District Attorneys Association said about Prop 57, the Public Safety & Rehabilitation Act of 2016, that Governor

Jerry Brown's intent in pushing for passage of this proposition was simply to alleviate prison overcrowding and avoid a possible federal court order to release prisoners.

It appears to me there was a total lack of concern in protecting the public by Brown's support of Prop. 57. His only interest these days it seems is to be dumping taxpayer dollars into "the train from somewhere going nowhere" fondly called the bullet train. It would seem more appropriate to spend tax dollars enhancing our criminal justice system with new prisons causing those who commit the crime to do the time.

Bates says, "Though Prop. 57 was intended to save the state money, it could lead to more crimes being committed by criminals released early from prison. SB 75 seeks to address this weakness in law by expanding the definition of "violent felonies" to include:

· vehicular manslaughter · human trafficking involving a minor

· battery with personal infliction of serious bodily injury

· throwing acid or a flammable substance

· assault with a deadly weapon

· assault with a deadly weapon on a peace officer or firefighter · assault with a deadly weapon

by a state prison inmate · discharging a firearm at an

occupied dwelling, building, vehicle or aircraft

· rape where victim is legally incapable of giving consent

· rape of an unconscious per-

· rape/sodomy/oral copulation of an unconscious person or by use of date rape drugs

· inflicting corporal injury on a child

· domestic violence

· arson of a structure or forest land

 \cdot arson of property

· solicitation to commit murder

· grand theft of a firearm

· any felony involving the personal use of a deadly weapon

· holding a hostage by a state prison inmate

· exploding a destructive device or explosive with intent to iniure

There is no conversation I have these days with anyone that sooner or later when we talk about what is happening in our cities that crime doesn't come up. We are seeing an increase in crime - violent crime - and all are concerned. The damage being done, not just financial but emotional, is long-term if not life-long for the victim and the victim's families.

SB 75 is currently awaiting a hearing in the Senate Public Safety Committee and I'm sure will be amended several times before it comes to a vote for passage. This might be one we want to keep an eye on to see how the votes - the yea's and nay's fall in the final count.

(Proverbs 6:16-19.)

Two centuries later Gregory the Great codified the list that since his time has been the best known: lust, gluttony, sadness, avarice, anger, envy and pride. In Catholic doctrine, these are Capital Sins that will land the sinner in hell!

The protection against falling into these evil habits is known in the West as the seven virtues: chastity, temperance, charity, diligence, patience, kindness and humility.

I assume none of us gets up in the morning and before breakfast checks to see whether anything on either the bad or the good list is on our agenda for the day. However, many of us have catalogues of both good and bad rules for living that exist outside our conscious systems of easy recall.


A couple of generations ago Gandhi came up with what he felt poisoned not only the individual, but also society. Here is his list of the deadly sins.

"TIME JOCKEY" - First Railroad

1835, the brig Pilgrim pulled into San Pedro Bay and dropped anchor two miles off shore. A long boat was loaded and a crew of a dozen rowed to shore and climbed the steep cliffs along the coast. A young Bostonian named Richard Henry Dana was aboard the Pilgrim and wrote that the harbor was the worst he had seen along California's coast. Without protection from the wind, a rough inbound current and no beach landing, Dana wondered what this place could ever have to offer. His answer was produced in a short time when he found out that the San Pedro area was the best place in California for hides. Dana never traveled the 25 miles from San

While it takes a bit more reflection to digest what Gandhi's list implies, it moves us in a wider orbit. If sinfulness is primarily a matter of individual choice, are these evil habits also the symptoms of what makes for an irresponsible community or even a decadent nation? A couple of generations ago the American theologian and social critic, Reinhold Niebuhr, authored a book with the intriguing title, Moral Man and Immoral Society. His point basically when good individuals organize in social units, their conduct may well be less noble then what they hold to be virtuous person by person.

The United States is at heart a nation of moral, honest people. Yes, there are some rotten apples, but I don't believe we are really a basket of deplorables. But as a people we have done some terribly wicked things. Slavery, segregation, the slaughter of America's native peoples on our way from sea to shining sea. Few of us would pull the switch frying or poisoning to death convicted criminals, but as a society we all participate in that murderous act.

I hear from a solid collection of people who voted for President Trump. They tend to be rather pleasant highly moral individuals. They love not only their children, but also their neighbors. They are charitable, and spend their energy and resources taking care of those in their communities who need help. They are motivated by some real definition of love.

Loving and attending to the needs of the less fortunate is a profound virtue. But getting together in a political party, for instance, takes love to a very much broader dimension. It is called "justice," and justice calls for a common action that is much more than charity, and is very difficult for individuals to pull off. Justice has political implications. Justice becomes real, not just in acts of compassion, but in legislation. We cannot pass laws mandating love, but we can develop societal rules mandating justice.

Each noontime in our retirement community when we gather for our common noon meal, we pray for the less fortunate. That's a good thing to do. But if we were really serious about the world's hungry, we would be insisting that our political representatives generate the legislation that insures a fairer distribution of what makes for life-sustaining nutrition.

Most of us can be very good all by ourselves. It is when we are together-perhaps in political communities, then it becomes much more difficult to give ourselves to the common good. That only happens when charity becomes justice.

Pedro to Los Angeles but others like Hugo Reid were willing to take the trip to Los Angeles or the Pueblo as it was known in the 1830's. Los Angeles was nearly an empty dusty town with several adobes placed in an irregular shape and design. But the route between San Pedro and Los Angeles had been established and by the 1850's, the San Pedro Road was officially established. Stage lines competed against each to provide transportation between the two growing towns. Fare rates initially started a \$5 a trip but competition lowered the rates to the bare minimum \$1 with the stage coaches traveling the fastest receiving most of the paying

terprising trade between Los Angeles and San Pedro grew to nearly \$250,000 per month. A young ambitious merchant by the name of Phineas Banning opened up San Pedro to the rest of the world when after four years of petitioning Congress he finally succeeded in it getting it recognized as an official point of entry. Shortly thereafter San Pedro was the center for importing and exporting goods across the Pacific. The Alexander-Banning shipping business became the most popular shipping line along the west coast. Banning sought to schedule the regular arrival of ships into San Pedro Bay but knew that he needed to build a harbor to provide a safe landing port for merchant trade ships. He shared his vision with other investors with his same goal of increasing their own trade, investors such as John G. Downey, Benjamin Wilson and William Sanford all wanted to grow their business interests. Banning and his investors purchased 2,400 acres of land just a couple of miles from shore and named it Wilmington, after Banning's birthplace in Delaware. He then built a large warehouse to store goods for shipping and built Southern California's first rail line to move the goods from storage to the harbor for loading. The freight cars were pulled by horse and even though the line was a mere 600 yards in length, the goods which traveled over the line made San Pedro, Wilmington and Los Angeles the most prosperous business centers in Southern California Joe Castillo is a freelance historical writer and can be reached at joeacastillo@aol.com






Capital Market Moves Are Not Always Logical

Logic dictates that value should generally increase based on merit and quantifiable data. This means a stock should generally appreciate over the longterm because it is firing on the proper cylinders to profitably fuel growth. A stock should ideally be growing revenues, growing earnings, increasing market share, increasing brand awareness, and generally being innovative and exhibiting leadership in its space. Of course, while this is logical, it is not always the case.

Enter human emotion. Humans may thrive on mathematical analysis, but we also love a great story. We also like it when a decision seems easy to make. But when greed mixes with speculation and snowballs into euphoria, this creates the perfect recipe for market bubbles. Bubbles come in many shapes and sizes, from one single stock through an entire sector, all the way up to an entire general market index.

The good news is that earnings trends are generally positive. According to FactSet Earnings Insight, as of February 3, 2017, 55% of the S&P 500 has reported results for Q4 2016 and 65%of them beat earnings estimates while 52% beat sales estimates. The less rosy news is that 44 S&P 500 Companies provided guidance which indicated earnings would be lower, while only 21 provided higher guidance. The Financial sector improved on its dead-last revenue disappointments recently. Financials improved from 100% to now 47% of Companies disappointing in revenues. Utilities now hold that dubious honor with 100% disappointing on sales. Consumer Staples has 80% of Companies reporting sales below estimates. The Trump Bump stocks are showing signs that buying support may wane in the absence of solid fundamentals. On the flip side of the coin, many financial Companies and energy companies are beating expectations or prior reported earnings and guiding optimistically.



stocks. The Dow Industrials shot back over 20,000, while the S&P 500 closed in on a new all-time high around 2,300. No matter what the Trump Administration and its many critics keep throwing at us, the market usually focuses more on corporate earnings than politics. Since we are in the middle of earnings season, stocks with strong revenues, earnings, and forward guidance will likely continue to lead the market.

Another factor fueling the stock market rally is the speed of which the Trump Administration is implementing executive orders. Trump's meeting with union leaders recently was a pleasant surprise, as was the news of the "go ahead" on the Keystone and Dakota pipelines that will create lots of union jobs, including American steel. These probusiness and pro-labor actions have ignited a second stage of the rally that commenced after the Presidential election. Due to these pleasant surprises and corporate earnings unfolding, Wall Street expects 20,000 to be a new floor for the overall stock market.

The earnings environment is likely going to get better as 2017 unfolds, especially if corporate tax reform is passed. The only wild card is just how much a strong U.S. dollar may impede GDP growth, like it did in the fourth quarter. Obviously, the Trump Administration is striving for 4% annual growth, which is very ambitious, but high consumer and business confidence could deliver 3+% growth.

While many on Wall Street think 2017 will be an up year for the U.S. stock market, due to resumption of earnings growth af-

risks facing the European Union, where elections in France, the Netherlands, Germany, and possibly Italy, may produce populist results that threaten the existence of the EU itself. There are also those Presidential policy tweets that tend to raise eyebrows...

THE WALL

It appears that President Trump and Mexican President Enrique Peña Nieto are having a bit of a tiff over the new border wall. Recently, President Nieto officially canceled his meeting with President Trump, while reiterating that Mexico would not pay for the new border wall. President Trump then instructed his press secretary Sean Spicer to announce that the U.S. would impose a 20% border tax on Mexican imports to raise \$10 billion a year to pay for the border wall.

In 2015, Mexico exported \$296 billion in goods to the U.S., so a 20% border tax could (in theory) be as high as \$59 billion! Clearly, the trade wars are now taking shape, although Wall Street suspects that the threat of a 20% border tax may be posturing for eventual negotiations when cooler heads will prevail, so that both sides can claim victory. However, in the interim, currently both President Trump and President Nieto are trying to appeal to their respective political bases. Stay tuned, since this escalating fight with Mexico will be fascinating to watch and naturally may spook some companies that import goods from Mexico.

The market seems to jerk wildly as it reacts to a steady stream of intraday headlines. From the perspective of the market, the onslaught of media squawking seems to have just been so much noise. The market doesn't seem to care about executive orders as much as actual people do. The conflict and controversy of everyday action is certainly not reflected in the broad market indices. It's been business as usual at least the usual since November 8th.

Are there any low-downpayment home loans available nowadays?

Yes! There are a couple. With one, you put 1-percent down and the wholesale lending company adds 2-percent so your downpayment is 3-percent. annuities and life insurance can enable beneficiaries to pay bills and taxes in a much timelier manner

I'll be turning 70^{1/2} next year. If I buy an annuity this year, will I have to pay surrender fees or penalties on money taken out to fulfill the RMD rules?

Insurance companies, which offer annuities, allow you to put your money into an annuity, and waive surrender fees on any amounts taken to fulfill the Required Minimum Distribution rules.

We want to start saving for our 5-year old's college expenses and are having a tough time deciding which way to go. What do you suggest?

More and more states are eliminating their 529 college savings plans. With any of these plans, watch for fees which can eat up a considerable amount of the earnings. Most, if not all, college savings plans require use of the funds at an accredited higher-education facility. What

if your child decides to attend a non-accredited religious or trade school? What if your child wants to buy or start a business rather than attend college? Consider an investment that your child could use not only for education, but also for the purchase of her first home, medical emergencies, etc.? Instead, I recommend either an equity-indexed life insurance policy with living benefits, or a fixed-indexed annuity.

Is whole-life insurance the only kind of life insurance that builds a cash account?

No, there's also universal life, variable universal life, and equity-indexed universal life. In my opinion, the best out there is Equity Indexed Universal Life. This is life insurance with an underlying savings account that is not in the stock market. You are given the choice annually to allocate part of your premium to a fixed return premium, or to several other avenues with higher potential gains without risk of loss.

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


