By Jorge V. Rosales AZUSA - Friday, July 27, 2018 was the 65th anniversary since the end of the Korean War. For the past 14 years the Azusa

Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8070 (VFW), American Legion Post 180 (AL), Veterans Memorial Committee (AVMC), and the City of Azusa (City) have hosted an Annual Korean War Armistice Day Ceremony in front of Azusa's City Hall to honor all Korean War Veterans alive, dead, and missing-in-action. The ceremony was started by John P. Moreno, Korean War Veteran in 2005 to honor all Korean War Veterans, known as "the Forgotten Soldiers," and as an opportunity to get together and see each other, perhaps for one last time.

The Korean War began on June 25, 1950 and ended on July 27, 1953, with the execution of an Armistice which ended three years of bitter warfare on the Korean Peninsula, stopped the spread of Communism in Korea, and established a committee of representatives from neutral countries to decide the fate of thousands of prisoners of war on both sides. More than 1.7 million Americans faced forbidding terrain and harsh combat in Korea.

In the space of 37 months, the United States lost nearly 36,574 soldiers and 103,284 returned home wounded. Even today, 64 years after the guns went silent 7,926 Americans are still missing in action.

In attendance at the ceremony were over 150 persons, including approximately 20 Korean War Veterans from Azusa and surrounding cities. They were honored with the presence of Hec-

tor Elizalde for Congresswoman Grace Napolitano; Jorge Marquez for Senator Dr. Ed Hernandez, O.D.; a Representative for Assemblywoman Blanca Rubio; and Eva Thiel-Maiz and Hoang Nguyen for L.A. County Supervisor Hilda Solis. Azusa Mayor Joe Rocha was out of town so the welcoming remarks were delivered by Councilman Eddie Alvarez.

A highlight of the ceremony was when the master of ceremonies asked that all Korean War Veterans please stand if they could or simply raise their hands. At that moment AVMC members began handing out to each Korean War Veteran a long-stem Yellow Rose which signifies joy, happiness and friendship.

The ceremony concluded with the singing of "God Bless America" by all in attendance led by Scarlet Biberstein, after raffles of a Korean veteran cap and a large coffee cup were conducted and closing remarks by Commander Martinez and the Benediction by Reverend Fernandes.

# **Azusa Man Arrested After Attacking Family and Police**

AZUSA - On Tuesday, around 10:30 PM, July 24, Azusa Police Department received a desperate call from a lady who claimed her grandson is going crazy and knocking out windows in her home and cars in the area.

When officers arrived at the home in the 700 block of South Vincent, they found an individual who was bloody and screaming at family members who were trying to calm him down. The officers attempted to talk with the unidentified 22-year-old Azusa man, only to have him turn on them and wanting to fight them. He challenged the officers and attacked them after he failed to follow commands to stop. As they attempted to restrain him he resisted and continued to fight the officers. During the altercation, the suspect continued to pull on items attached to the gun belt. Concerns that he may secure something and use it against the officers; they finally deployed the use of a Taser to bring him under control. The officers did not want to be put into a position where they may have to use deadly force to neutralize the situation.

This basically resolved the aggressiveness of the suspect and he was taken into custody.

The officers treated the man for his injuries that he received from knocking out windows. They also transported him to the hospital as a precautionary measure to see whether or not he needed to be treated for drugs or any other injuries.

One officer was also injured

and had to be hospitalized. The nature of the injury was not disclosed and the officer is expected to recover in time.

Apparently this whole thing was over the fact that the family did not fix his broken cell phone. He started yelling and then went crazy according to the grandmother and that is when he started damaging the home, knocking out windows and then going outside and breaking car windows in the area.

The family felt he was loaded on something which caused him to get violent.

The police have responded to this area in the past. The bail was set for \$50,000 and had three felony charges filed against him.


# **Monterey Park Police Arrest Commercial Burglary Suspects**

MONTEREY PARK - On July 25, 2018 at approximately 2:00 a.m., an officer conducted a traffic stop in the area of Atlantic Boulevard and Garvey Avenue. The officer recognized the subjects and vehicle as those matching the description from nine previous commercial burglaries that had occurred in Monterey Park since February 2018

The follow up investigation and video evidence led detectives to believe these suspects committed at least nine commercial burglaries in Monterey Park. Both suspects are career criminals and have extensive criminal histories with multiple burglary arrests. The two suspects were booked for warrants and suspicion of commercial burglary [836(a)(3)/459 PC].

The suspects are identified as Timothy Carver Johnson, 52, from Los Angeles and Otis Lee Wishum, 63, from Los Angeles.

Johnson's arrest record dates back to 1985. Wishum's arrest record dates back to 1969.

# **County To Develop Centralized Resource Hub For Transitional Age Foster Youth**

LOSANGELES COUNTY-The Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a motion by Supervisor Kathryn Barger to create an online Centralized Transitional Age Youth (TAY) Hub to provide vital access to programs and services to youth, caregivers, social workers and advocates.

The proposed online Centralized TAY Hub will improve the county's ability to serve TAY as they age out of the foster care system by helping them connect to education, career and housing resources.

"The county has created countless programs over the years to provide valuable job training, access to transportation, educational stability and other services to foster youth. Yet, we continue to have a number of Transitional Age Youth exit out of the child welfare system facing poor outcomes and at risk of becoming another devastating statistic of homelessness, substance abuse addiction and mental health issues," Supervisor Kathryn Barger said. "We need to develop a coordinated system so youth know what is available to them and are connected to the right cy.' services at the right time to en-

rich their lives."

The 4-0 vote gave the Chief Executive Office the directive to explore means to develop and launch the Hub, coordinate with the Office of Child Protection and other relevant departments and agencies, and develop Management Appraisal Performance Program goals to ensure streamlined and effective service delivery.

Department of Children and Family Services Director Bobby Cagle cited that there are about 10,000 TAY in Los Angeles County who would benefit from this program.

"We have to do what we can to provide them with the tools and resources they need so they can achieve their dreams and live the lives they hope to lead when they reach adulthood," Cagle said. "As with any vulnerable population, we have learned that individual departments cannot effectively serve a child in isolation. We know that enhanced coordination, along with the better integration of resources, will improve services for our foster youth and help them achieve self-sufficien-

# **Reintroduction of Endangered Frog Continues in Angeles National Forest**

**ARCADIA** - Recovery efforts for the federally endangered Southern California population of mountain yellow-legged frogs (Rana muscosa) moved forward with the release of over 250 tadpoles by Los Angeles Zoo to their historic ranges in the Angeles National Forest on July 26. This continues the release of the species in both the Angeles and San Bernardino National Forests. This year's efforts began last month and will continue throughout the summer and in the years ahead. The regional effort is the result of a partnership between U.S. Forest Service, Los Ange-

les Zoo, San Diego Zoo Global, Henry Doorly Zoo (Omaha, Nebraska), California Department of Fish and Wildlife, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, U.S. Geological Survey, and others. The frogs are being bred in captivity

caused by chytrid fungus. Scientists determined that captive rearing offered the species the best chance of recovery. Other measures being taken to help the species recover include removal of non-native fish and bullfrogs

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at the zoos and reintroduced to their native streams in the San Bernardino, San Gabriel and San Jacinto mountains.

In 2002, it was estimated that fewer than 100 adult frogs remained in the wild. Threats to the species include habitat loss, pollution, non-native predators and the deadly amphibian disease chytridiomycosis, which is

from streams and conducting research to inform future actions.

Recovery efforts, now in their 12th year, have resulted in nearly 5,000 frogs being released into their historic range. Breeding at several sites in the Angeles and San Bernardino National Forests has been observed in post-release surveys by USGS.

## "TIME JOCKEY" - C. Hart Merriam

Indian History... Dr. Clinton Hart Merriam was born in 1855 and died in 1942. He was an American anthropologist, zoologist, mammologist, orthographer, ornithologist, entomologist, ethnographer, photographer and naturalist. He began his career studying birds, completed his doctorate and then proceeded to study mammals and zoology. In 1899 Merriam accepted a commission to organize and direct the Harriman Alaska Expedition which was financed by E. H. Harriman. About 1900 his natural history interests became directed to California where he built a home in Lagunitas, Marin County, and about this time he began to record observations on California Indians.

When Harriman died, his widow offered Merriam a lifetime grant to research the topic of his choice. Merriam was considered an expert in the field of mammalogy and it was expected that he would choose it to continue his life's work. However, Merriam felt a deep need to help California Indians and decided to learn the language and document the tribal life of all the Indians located in California. He planned to study the living habitats and

condition of the Indians including the food sources, clothing needs and housing requirements similarly to how he studied mammals and other animals. It was his plan to learn how the Indians lived, their way of life, and as such could learn their language while also identifying their tribal boundaries.

From 1910 to 1937, Merriam dedicated himself to his new purpose in life. He became a leading member of the American Anthropology Association which included such leading anthropologists such as Dr. Alfred (A.L.) Kroeber, Dr. Rolan Burrage Dixon, Dr. Charles Peabody, D. I. Bushnell, Mrs. Hubert Howe Bancroft, Charles Lummis, A.C. Vroman and Mrs. Phoebe Hearst. Members were located as far away as Alaska, Australia, Berlin, Mexico, Bombay, New Zealand and The Hague. It was the leading anthropology association in the world.

Merriam began his study of California Indians in 1903 and arrived at the Fort Tejon Rancherias in 1905 to write about the various Indian tribes who had been relocated from Southern California locations. He recorded and took pictures of the last remaining members of various

tribes in order to preserve their memories and recollection of past tribal customs and languages. But Merriam had one disadvantage in that he didn't know the various Indian languages and was dependent upon translators to help him speak with the various tribesmen. One of the translators was Mrs. J.V. Rosemyre (nee Narcissa Higuera), who was born in San Gabriel around 1852 and relocated to the Fort Tejon reservation moving onto a Rancheria. Rosemyre was married to Dr. James V. Rosemyre who was a volunteer observer at the reservation. Rosemyre became Merriam's primary translator and in his notes he documented what she said regarding the various Indian people and tribes located at the reservation. It was Merriam's dedicated works that led him to document the lost Indian tribes and languages so that today we have his works which provide much of the information we now know about the Native Americans of California.....

# 2020 Initiative Repeals SB 54 Religion—When It Heals

Children, Family, and Community Protection Act is an initiative, filed on April 28th and on June 22nd received title and approval to circulate. Filed by Don Rosenberg, father of a young man killed by an illegal immigrant, and a coalition of parents and citizens, said this effort would end SB 54 Sanctuary State law. Ravi Mehta, former chair of FPPC, is attorney of record with Attorney General's Office.

The initiative would address three major areas with the first being SB 54, the California Values Act (Sen. Kevin De Leon), AB 450's infringement of employers right to work with law enforcement and ICE, and AB 60 known as Motor Voter. AB 450 has already been invalidated by the court but this initiative reinforces that action and it will not be legal to happen again.

Children, Family, and Community Protection Act requires:

• State and local law enforcement to interface and work with federal officials and attempt to verify the immigration status of arrestees.

• Criminal penalties for rogue politicians who might attempt to declare their jurisdiction a "sanctuary" from the law and become non-compliant. Fine is a minimum of \$10,000.

• Repeal of sections of the Labor Code criminalizing private employers who cooperate with federal immigration authorities and frees all California employers to use the federal E-Verify system when hiring.

• Prohibition on issuing driver's licenses or identification cards without verifying citizen-

ship or immigration status. • Revocation of an illegal alien's California Driver's License or renew the one he/she posses putting an end to the State's ability to automatically register illegal aliens to vote.

What our Secretary of State, Alex Padilla, published and is reprinted in Ballotpedia says: 1853. (18-0002)) Requires Use of State and Local Law-Enforcement Resources for Federal Immigration Purposes. **Restricts Voter Registration** Process. Initiative Statute. Supporters have until Dec. 19 to gather nearly 366,000 signatures in order to qualify the measure for the November 2020 ballot.

Don Rosenberg spoke before the Santa Clarita City Council, and his message was replayed on Fox News, encouraging the Council to join a federal lawsuit withdrawing from Sanctuary City status. Roseberg said, "For those ... who don't seem to have a problem and recognizing this crime, I'm asking you to pick one of your loved ones and kill them for no reason. And then maybe you will have a little bit of an idea of walking in my shoes."

Rosenberg's son, Drew, a second year law student, was killed in a 2010 in a collision in San Francisco by a Honduran immigrant who had entered the country illegally. LA Times, Steve Lopez, 1/14/18 recounts the incident:

"Drew was riding his motorcycle at an intersection and a Honduran-born man named Roberto Galo hit Drew at low speed and then, either in panic, confusion or an attempt to get away, hit him again."

Rosenberg told Lopez, "He backed up, drove over him a second time, and then went forward again. The rear tire was on my son's abdomen. He was probably already dead at that point ..."

Rosenberg went on to tell Steve Lopez that Galo was in the U.S. on temporary protected status which means he could have qualified for a drivers license but didn't have one. Five months before Drew's death, Galo was stopped by police and cited for going the wrong way on a oneway street and driving without a license or insurance.


After the accident that took young Rosenberg's life, Galo was convicted of voluntary manslaughter, sentenced to six months in jail, and was released after 43 days. Rosenberg's message in the Daily Signal to Gov. Brown: "I wish he would get on the bullet train, first stop to hell, and he should get off and stay there,"

## **Our Heroes Have Always Been Cowboys**

Willie Nelson said it best. "My heroes have always been cowboys." That was true of a lot of kids, like me, growing up in Phoenix in the 1950's and 60's. Our "Valley of the Sun" was the home to lots of country stars and a flourishing radio, music, and local television market that fostered a lot of rock-in-roll and rockabilly entertainers including Lee Hazelwood, Waylon Jennings, Duane Eddy and Glendale, Arizona's own Marty Robbins. If

Southwest, The Cisco Kid." We loved them all. And did you ever hear of Bass Reeves? He was a deputy U.S. Marshall in Texas, Arkansas, and the Oklahoma territory who dispensed justice at "Judge Parker's convenience." Reeves is believed to be the inspiration for "The Lone Ranger." Did I fail to mention this? Bass

Reeves was also an African-

American. Obviously, I take some exception to the negative symbolism the professor attributes to the "man on horseback." In a remake of the film "Monte Walsh" often seen on TV, William Devane played an old cowboy named Brennan who was talking to Mr. Slocumb, a tenderfoot bureaucrat. Brennan tried to explain what a cowboy was. "All they got is freedom and pride. Keeping their word and looking out for one another. All they got is their rules." Slocumb asked, "Where are these rules written down?" His reply, "They are not written down, you damn fool, they are LIVED." And that summed it up.

Anyone having taken only a cursory look at religion-now or in its long history—must realize that sometimes it has been the source of healing and hope, and sometimes it has produced bigotry, war and brutality. While we must avoid oversimplifying a very complex set of societal dynamics, when religion, or some form of it, has been dominant in any culture it is obvious that the result has been either peace, compassion and justice, or violence, cruelty and injustice. When religion has only been a neutral thread in the cultural fabric it has probably been ignored by almost everybody.

I begin by looking at religion when its major thrust has been a commitment to a healing centered in an ethical imperative. Nothing has encapsulated this spirit any better than what has been called "the golden rule": "Do to others what you would have others do to you." While this perspective lies at the core of the Christian commitment, it is also embodied in every major world religion, as well as in the perspective of a variety of lesser-known sacred traditions. Let me draw from various religious precepts that parallel the Christian affirmation.

• Buddhism—"Hurt not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful.'

• Hinduism—"Do not do to others what would cause pain if done to you." • Islam—"None of you truly

believes until he wishes for his brother what he wishes for himself. • Judaism—"Thou shalt love


thy neighbor as thyself." • Sikhism—"No one is my en-

emy, none a stranger, and everyone is my friend." • Sufism—"The basis of Sufism is a consideration of the

hearts and feelings of others." • Brahmanism –"Do naught unto others which would cause you pain if done to you."

• Jainism—"One should treat all creatures in the world as one would like to be treated."

• Zoroastrianism—"Do not do unto others whatever is injurious

panded to include major philosophic traditions that undergird most religious systems, and confirm the positive relation between philosophy and religion.

Plato—"May I do to others as I would that they should do to me,"

Kant-"Act as if the maxim of thy actions were to become by thy will a universal law of nature."

Confucius—"Do not do to others what you do not want to be done to you."

If these ethical precepts offer the formula for any religion that is a blessing wherever and whenever it takes root, what of the converse? I suggest that the more any religion is fixated on the exclusivity of its own doctrine, the greater the probability that war, violence and bigotry will follow in its wake.

Among faithful Jews, the political clout of the ultra Orthodox has been a major factor in resisting any resolution of the Palestinian stalemate. This kind of religious bigotry has also been endorsed by American Christian fundamentalists. John Hagee, president of "Christians United for Israel," holds that this support will eventually lead Israeli Jews to accept Jesus as their messiah and be saved from the eternal punishment awaiting all those who do not call Jesus "Lord."

No religious fundamentalism is more harmful these days than the commitment to doctrinal purity in a variety of Muslim sects, beginning with the Taliban. The horror facing us is not born of Islamic culture but Islamic fundamentalism. The absolutism of certain Hindu sects has kept armies on both sides of the in-

While passionately held doctrine is the precursor to bigotry, war and bloodshed throughout history, we find no clearer evidence of the destructive nature of doctrinal purity than in The United States. We begin with the Salem witch trials of February 1692 and May 1693. These trials resulted in the execution of twenty people, all but one by hanging. Fourteen of those executed were women. Five others (including two infant children) died in prison. The trials eventuating in these executions were conducted under the auspices of religious leaders, basically members of the Protestant clergy, who recited Biblical texts to prove the validity of their God ordained doctrinal purity.

Consider the slaughter of aboriginal tribes in America's west, ... with the cross of Jesus going on before." Or reflect on the immoral political blasphemy of the Trump Administration that resulted in the separation of children from their parents, a policy justified by Attorney General Sessions, who quoted a passage from Romans 13;1 as proof that God demands obedience to government sanctioned law. (Let evervone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God.)

In the history of the American South, either in an era politically dominated by Democrats or Republicans, doctrinally pure Christians evoked the same Biblical evidence proving the divine endorsement of the slave trade and slavery, lynching, segregation, the KKK, the white citizens councils and segregation ... right down to God's support of this Administration's draconian immigration policies.

So it is not religion that corrupts society, but doctrinal exclusivism. The argument that one can properly claim both Christian ethics and doctrinal orthodoxy as the basis of a legitimate faith may be valid. But beware, that perspective may be a slippery slope resulting in the bigotry evidenced


Why am I mentioning all of this stuff?




## When Will All The Fear Mongering End?

It's been six months since the stock market staged its first "tariff tantrum" in late January, after President Trump announced his first small tariff increases on some washing machines and solar panels.

The seemingly endless stream of negative trade news seems to have claimed its "first casualty." CNBC has been trying to convince their viewers for much of this year that tariffs and trade wars would have significantly negative consequences for the U.S. economy. This relentless negative news apparently finally has caused viewers to change the channel. Maria Bartiromo of Fox Business News decisively "out rated" CNBC's Squawk Box during the second quarter. Bartiromo, who has great instincts on what viewers want, said, "I feel that audiences want something different." Overall, Fox Business News had the highest ratings for six of the top seven business show time slots on cable, so I suspect CNBC might even become less negative.

CNBC's Jim Cramer recently indicated that Trump may be right about tariffs and that the U.S. has been taken advantage of by Germany and other countries. Speaking of Germany, U.S. Ambassador to Germany Richard Grenell met the heads of BMW, Daimler (Mercedes) and Volkswagen (Audi, Bentley & Porsche) a little over a week ago in Berlin and told them that the U.S. would resolve the brewing trade dispute if they would just abolish their 10% to 25% tariffs on U.S. vehicles. In turn, the U.S. would drop most tariffs on vehicles imported from the European Union. The German auto heads, not surprisingly, were reported to have "liked" what they heard from Ambassador Grenell.

Both British Prime Minister Theresa May and German Chancellor Angela Merkel said that they would be ready to support negotiations on reducing tariffs



anywhere in the world that there is an "imbalance" could result in more equitable trade with minimal or no tariffs as one likely outcome. All that tariff speculation that you have heard on the fake news stations may have been misleading speculation, since it is evident that the Trump Administration's ultimate objective is freer or at least fairer trade.

So far tariffs may have even helped reduce the trade deficit. The Commerce Department announced recently that the US trade deficit declined 6.6% to \$43.05 billion in May (much better than the economists' consensus estimate of \$43.6 billion). Exports rose 1.9% to \$144.89 billion, while imports rose 0.4% to \$210.68 billion. The US trade deficit is (at least for now) at the lowest level since October 2016 (due partially to booming domestic crude oil production as well as soybean exports, which doubled in May to \$4.14 billion).

The recent surge in exports is projected to have added 1.4% to the USA's GDP growth in the second quarter! One key to sustaining strong GDP growth remains narrowing future USA trade deficits.

Recently China began imposing a 25% tariff on U.S. Soybeans, so it will be interesting to see how badly that impacts future soybean exports. Trump's more recent offer of aid to farmers, a \$12 Billion proposed package for the coming months, is in response to China's tariff retaliation.

Planned (threatened?) tariffs not yet in effect may not be imposed.

News of the deal boosted stocks both in the US and in Europe, although there are still plenty of details to work out and Juncker must now convince all 28 European states to negotiate these details. France and Germany, for instance, often have different trade priorities, the WSJ reports. The agreement is somewhat vague and the upcoming negotiations with Europe are sure to be contentious as the US remains embroiled in major trade disputes with China and other trading partners.

The Trump Administration's biggest recent commentary generator - the meeting with Russia - is raising speculation that a balancing force to OPEC's oil cartel could become an alliance between Russia, Saudi Arabia and the USA. Russia and Saudi Arabia are big swing producers and the Trump Administration has lobbied them to boost production as sanctions are re-imposed on Iran. Saudi Arabia has already pledged to boost its crude oil production and is all too happy to put pressure on Iran due to the seemingly endless proxy war it is having in Yemen against Iran. Russia will likely have to make any help it offers the Trump Administration very confidential, since Russia is unlikely to support any new action openly hurting Iran. Russia may ask for a tradeoff, such as a pledge that the US will quit interfering with Russian military operations in Syria.

Recent news out of the Fed revealed a couple of interesting details. First, the Fed seemed relieved to finally hit its 2% inflation target after failing to hit it since 2011. Second, the FOMC talked about tariffs a lot and hopefully will use this excuse to postpone further key interest rate hikes. Frankly, I still think one more interest rate hike is likely this year of a quarter point, but the fact that market rates remain remarkably "well behaved" may force the Fed to cut back on planned future rate hikes.

and it monitors many other devices to make sure they are working properly. If a system detects a problem, it needs to alert you, so you can bring the car in for service. This is the role of the check engine light.

The check engine light looks different from car to car. It is usually a yellow or orange color. It will rarely be red. Most of the time it illuminates in the shape of an engine. If the check engine light comes on solid (not blinking), you can continue to drive the car until you have a chance to bring it in. This does not mean you should ignore it.

When the check engine light is on, the car defaults to a backup system that controls all the important systems. Driving around for a short time until you can set up an appointment is no problem, but continuing to drive more than 20 miles is a bad idea.

If the check engine light is blinking rhythmically, this indicates a serious problem! A computer system has had a major malfunction that will damage the catalytic converter. If you notice a blinking check engine light, you do not need to stop in the middle of the bridge and call a tow truck,

The modern car is more complex than ever, and many folks believe a small hand-held code reader will tell you what's wrong with the car. This is incorrect information. It is called a code reader for a reason; it reads the trouble code for the major systems only. A code reader will not tell you the complete story of the car's condition.

Please don't diagnose or replace parts based on a code reader device. The only way to correctly find all the issues with your car is to use a scanner. The scanner does what it says; it scans all the modules and systems of the car, instead of a select few that a code reader does. Most cars have 20 to 100 modules; a code reader is not set to read even half of those.

What You Can Do One good thing you can do as a parent is create a parentdriver contract. It helps form an open line of communication about the importance of safety and the expectations that come with the new and profound responsibility of driving.

Among other things, the young driver promises to follow all traffic and safety rules, never drive under the influence of alcohol or drugs or ride with any driver who is, and avoid distracted driving such as texting or talking on the phone while driving.

The parents promise to provide and maintain a safe vehicle, pay for driver training classes and materials, be available to ride along, pick the young person up or arrange a ride home whenever necessary regardless of the time or situation, and lead by example by exhibiting safe driving behavior.
