Councilmember John Fasana Does Not File for Re-Election After 33 Years of Public Service to the City of Duarte During his tenure on the Metro

Fasana has represented the San

Gabriel Valley on the Los Ange-

les County Metro Board since

Metro's inception in 1993 and

served as the Metro Board Chair

in 2001-2002 and 2016-2017.

DUARTE - Councilmember John Fasana announced that after 33 years of serving on the Duarte City Council, he will not seek reelection in November.

Friday, August 7th was the last day he could have filed papers for re-election. Fasana shared the news with his colleagues and residents at the June 23rd virtual City Council meeting that he would not be seeking re-election.

"I wanted to take that moment to focus on encouraging residents living in District 2 to come forward as candidates," stated Fasana. "Serving one's community is an honor and privilege, but it takes preparation and a substantial time commitment. Running for office is a big decision."

After moving to Duarte with his wife Kris in 1985, Fasana was first elected to the Duarte City Council in November 1987 and was re-elected in subsequent elections. Since Duarte adopted council districts in 2018, Fasana has represented District 2. Serving as Mayor first in 1990 and five other times during his tenure, Fasana worked to promote transportation, community services, and environmental protection issues in Duarte.

"Duarte has advanced enormously from Councilmember Fasana's outstanding leadership, especially in the area of transpor-

tation which has not only benefited our residents, but improved Los Angeles County as a whole," said Mayor Samuel Kang. "I know I speak for the entire City Council in thanking him for his exemplary public service. His expertise and professionalism have been transformative to Duarte and the San Gabriel Val-

Board. Fasana worked with colleagues in Sacramento and Washington, D.C. to obtain several billion dollars for critically needed multimodal congestion relief projects, including creation of Metro Express Lanes. Fasana's policy direction led to the establishment of the Foothill Extension Construction Authority Board that built the Gold Line light-rail station in Duarte and extension to Azusa that began serving customers in March 2016. He also secured funds to build soundwalls that help mitigate noise for Duarte residents and students adjacent to Interstate 210.

Notably, Fasana has advocated for youth programs, serving on the Duarte Education Foundation and local YMCA boards. Over the years, he and his colleagues worked together to open the Duarte Teen Center, build new parks, and develop a new middle school and performing arts cen-

"Stepping aside as City Councilmember for this community was a hard decision," said Fasana. "However, it is time. I am grateful for the leadership of my colleagues, the professionalism of city staff, and the trust of our residents. I will always cherish my time on the City Council but look forward to being a resident on the other side of the dais. I thank Duarte voters for their support through the years. Duarte has a bright future and will benefit from a fresh perspective on the City Council."

In 2015, Fasana retired from his Regulatory Project Manager position with Southern California Edison after 35 years of service. He is a graduate of Whittier College. Fasana and his wife have three adult children and two sonsin-law.

The deadline to file election papers for residents interested in running for the District 2 seat was extended to Wednesday, August 12 at 5:00 p.m., when Councilmember Fasana did not file. Current Economic Development Commissioner Vinh Truong was the only candidate that filed for District 2 and submitted enough qualified signatures to the Los Angeles County Recorder's Office. Duarte City Councilmembers will hold a Special Meeting next week to consider appointing Truong to fill the District 2 position, effective December 8, 2020.



Arrest Made In Gas Station Attack That Left Victim With Memory Loss

IRWINDALE - On Sunday, July 12, 2020 at about 2:11 AM, City of Irwindale police officers responded to the Arco gas station located at 110 Longden Street in the city of Irwindale regarding a male found lying in the parking lot.

On arrival, officers located a 61-year-old male victim with head trauma who was unconscious and non-responsive. The victim was treated by paramedics and taken to a local trauma center in serious condition. As a result of his injuries, the victim suffered substantial memory loss and has been unable to make a statement to investigators.

Officers learned from security camera recordings at the gas station that the victim got into a confrontation in the parking lot with an adult male, who arrived at the location in another vehicle. During the confrontation, the suspect suddenly and without apparent provocation, stuck the victim in the face, causing him to fall to the ground and hit his head on the concrete, rending him unconscious and non-responsive. The suspect fled the location in a vehicle.

Using information from the security camera footage, investigators issued a release to the public asking for information on the identity of the suspect. This release included photographs of the suspect obtained from the security recordings, as well as a portion of the actual video footage. The release was shared on

the police department's social media accounts and website and received substantial media cov-

Shortly after issuing the release, anonymous information was received via the Crime Stoppers website regarding the identity of the suspect. Using this information, investigators developed additional information leading to the identity of the suspect in this case. On August 11, 2020, at about 5:30 PM, Irwindale Police Department detectives served an arrest warrant on the suspect, who was arrested

without incident in the city of Irwindale.

Jesus Avila, Jr., a 33-year-old resident of South El Monte, was booked on attempted homicide charges. He is currently being held at the West Covina Police Department Jail on \$2,001,500.00 bail, pending his court appearance.

The Irwindale Police Department would like to thank the members of the community who submitted tips and information via the Crime Stoppers website that lead to the identification and arrest of this suspect.



Contract for Body-Worn Cameras for the LA County Sheriff's Finalized

Board Anticipates Greater Accountability and Transparency

The contract for the body-worn camera program that will ensure greater accountability of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department has been finalized, enabling the Department to now order cameras and equipment at

its discretion starting today. Following months of collaborative efforts with the County, the Sheriff's Department and Axon Enterprise, Inc. entered a fully executed agreement for a Body-Worn Camera and Digital Evidence Management System.

The rollout of the camera program will be able to equip 5,200 deputies and security officers with devices over the next two years utilizing the nearly \$35 million that the Board of Supervisors set aside last year specifically dedicated for this program.

"I am pleased that the contract for Body-Worn Cameras has been finalized and the Sheriff can move forward with providing cameras to the deputies expeditiously. This is an important op-

> Since 2012, the Board has been proactive in enacting key policy initiatives and identifying appropriate funding and staffing to allow for the swift implementation and operation of the bodyworn camera program.

> "Since joining the Board of Supervisors, I have prioritized greater transparency and accountability from the Sheriff's Department," said Los Angeles County Board Chair Pro Tem Hilda L. Solis. "As part of that strategy, I have advocated for body-worn cameras. Body-worn cameras, when used as intended, can increase transparency in policing and promote accountability among our law enforcement agencies."

"George Floyd and Andres Guardado are sobering reminders of the critical need for transpar-

ency and accountability in law enforcement," said Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas. "Along with robust and independent oversight of the Sheriff's Department, body-worn cameras are essential for ensuring constitutional policing and for building trust in the communities that our deputies are sworn to protect and serve."

"Body-worn cameras are an important tool for transparency and I have been advocating to get them to our Sheriff's deputies since Sheriff Jim McDonnell was in office," said Supervisor Janice Hahn. "The videos these cameras capture will give us a clearer understanding of what actually happens in the interactions between our deputies and members of the public."

The finalizing of this contract is a culmination of ongoing efforts by the Board of Supervisors who will continue their commitment to prioritize greater transparency and accountability from the Sheriff's Department.

State Lottery Leadership **Appointment Barely Passes Senate Vote**

Lottery Still Owes Schools Millions of Dollars

Chang (R-Diamond Bar) raised concerns on the Senate Floor related to the state's Lottery Director appointment. After Senator Chang raised issues related to his handling of a recent audit, Alva Johnson's appointment confirmation passed the Senate Floor by just 3 three votes. A recent audit pushed by Senator Chang showed the Lottery owes at least \$36 million to schools. The Lottery has yet to return those funds despite schools facing a serious shortfall in funds.

"Usually when a state agency gets called out by the auditor, they explain how they are going to fix the problem," said Senator Chang. "Instead of recognizing what the auditor discovered, and paying back our schools, State Lottery leadership found excuses, kept the money, and then turned around and hired even more staff and in-house attorneys."

According to the State Auditor, "The Lottery has not prioritized funding to education when setting its budgets." The audit confirmed that while lottery sales revenue has increased by 115% since the Legislature's changes were adopted in 2010, payments

SACRAMENTO - Senator to schools increased by only 66%. It also found that for at least the 2017-18 fiscal year, the Lottery shortchanged schools \$36 million. This could be money for supplies, teachers, and technology in our public schools as they face the COVID pandem-

> Earlier this year, Senator Chang introduced legislation to require the Lottery to pay back those funds to schools but Senate leadership has refused to give that bill a hearing and an opportunity for a vote.

> "The big problem is that schools will continue to get shortchanged, year-over-year until the mess at the Lottery is cleaned up," added Chang. "Right now we are letting the Lottery gamble with our children's education and it has to stop. Every dollar wasted at the State Lottery, is a dollar that won't go to schools."

> The State Lottery has been at the center of a string of controversies, including last year when it was uncovered that the Lottery gave over \$200,000 in scratchers to audience members and staff of the Ellen show, without justifying why those dollars shouldn't go to schools instead.

Two Candidates to Vie for Duarte City Council **Seat in District 3**

DUARTE - A field of two candidates will vie for the Duarte City Council seat in District 3 in the November 3, 2020, election. The deadline for filing nomination papers closed on August 7 for Districts 3 and 7, and August 12 for District 2, when incumbent Councilmember John Fasana did not file for re-election.

District 3 incumbent Liz Reilly, 2013 Mayor and three-time Mayor Pro Tem, will be on the ballot. Public Safety Commissioner Jody Schulz will also run for the District 3 seat. Only one candidate, Economic Development Commissioner Vinh

Truong, filed for the seat being vacated by Councilmember John Fasana in District 2, and in District 7, Councilmember Toney Lewis was the only qualified candidate who filed for the seat. Per the State Elections Code, City Council may choose to appoint Truong and Lewis to four-year terms at a special meeting to be held on August 18 at 4:00 p.m.

The final day to register to vote in the November election is October 19. Voter registration forms are available on the LA County Registrar-Recorder website, http://lavote.net.

First West Nile Virus Death Reported in LA County

First death of 2020 reinforces need for all residents to take precautions against mosquitoes

Los Angeles County – The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) has confirmed the first death due to West Nile virus (WNV) for the 2020 season in Los Angeles County. The patient, an elderly resident of the South Los Angeles area, was hospitalized and died from WNV-associated neuro-invasive disease.

"West Nile virus continues to be a serious health threat to residents in Los Angeles County. We encourage residents to check for items that can hold water and breed mosquitoes, both inside and outside their homes, and to cover, clean or clear out those items. Residents should protect themselves from diseases spread by mosquitoes by using EPA-registered mosquito repellent products, especially during the peak mosquito season which lasts from June to November in Los Angeles County," said Muntu Davis, MD, MPH, Los Angeles County Health Officer.

Humans get WNV through the bite of an infected mosquito. Most mosquitoes do not carry the virus; therefore, most people bitten by a mosquito are not exposed to WNV. Those who do get WNV may experience mild symptoms including fever, muscle aches, and tiredness. In some cases, especially in persons over 50 years of age and those with chronic medical conditions such as cancer and diabetes, severe WNV infection can occur and affect the brain and spinal cord causing meningitis, encephalitis, and paralysis. There is no specific treatment for WNV disease and

no vaccine to prevent infection. A total of five cases have been documented in Los Angeles County so far this year (excluding Long Beach and Pasadena as cases identified in those cities are reported by their local health departments). WNV-infected mosquitoes, dead birds, and sentinel chickens have been identified across Los Angeles County. Public Health monitors cases of WNV infection and collaborates with local vector control agencies to reduce the risk of WNV to humans by promoting prevention and mosquito reduction.

Decrease your risk of expo-

1. PROTECT YOURSELF: Mosquito repellents can keep mosquitoes from biting you. EPA-registered repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, 2-undecanone, and oil of lemon eucalyptus are the longest lasting and most effective. They are available as sprays, wipes, and lotions. Find the repellent that's right for you here. Consider wearing long-sleeved clothes and pants when outside.

2. MOSQUITO PROOF YOUR HOME: Make sure that your doors and windows have tight-fitting screens to keep out mosquitoes. Repair or replace screens with tears or holes.

3. REDUCE MOSQUITOES: Mosquitoes lay their eggs on standing water.

• Check for items that hold water inside and outside your home once a week

• Cover water storage containers such as buckets and rain barrels. If no lid, use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mos-

• Clear standing water in flowerpots, saucers, birdbaths and other containers

• Clean and maintain swimming pools, spas and drain water from pool covers

• Cast out (throw away) old items in your patio or yard that can hold water, e.g., old car tires and children's toys

Legislation to Require Diversity on Corporate Boards Passes First Policy Committee

SACRAMENTO – A bill those that lack diversity." that requires diversity on corporate boards in California passed the Senate Committee on Banking and Financial Institutions. The legislation, AB 979, is joint authored by Assemblymembers Chris Holden, Cristina Garcia, and David Chiu, with Eloise Gomez Reyes as principal co-author. The bill requires publicly held corporations headquartered in California to have at least one director from an underrepresented community by the close of 2021.

"Corporations have money, power, and influence," said Assemblymember Chris Holden. "If we are going to address racial injustice and inequity in our society, it's imperative that corporate boards reflect the diversity of our State. One great benefit of this action – corporations with ethnically diverse boards have shown to outperform

Soon after the social unrest following the killing of George Floyd, many corporations publicly stated their support for diversity and Black lives. Critics, however, have pointed out that this public support for social justice movements often does not lead to long-term structural change in hiring and retention policies of a diverse staff and leadership. The current statistics are quite stark. The Harvard Law School Missing Pieces Report: The 2018 Board Diversity Census of Women and Minorities on Fortune 500 Boards found that out of 1,222 new board members of Fortune 100 companies, 77% were white.

"The lack of diversity on California's boards and upper level corporate positions is a challenge we urged corporations to address on their own during our time in the Legisla-

ture. However, it is clear we can no longer wait for corporations to figure it out on their own. By ensuring diversity on their boards, we know the corporations are more likely to both create opportunities for people of color and give them the support to thrive within that corporation," said Assemblymember Cristina Garcia.

In addition to the 2021 benchmark, AB 979 also requires corporate boards to include two members from underrepresented communities for corporations with more than four members, while corporations with more than nine must have a minimum of three by 2022. The bill defines a director from an underrepresented community as an individual who self-identifies as Black, African American, Hispanic, Latino, Asian, Pacific Islander, Native American, Native Hawaiian, or Alaska Native.

Guest Commentary: Trump Seeks Scapegoats Abroad, **Instead Of Solutions At Home**

In March of this year, the San Francisco Bay Area became the first in the United States to issue a "shelter-in-place" decree to control the spread of Covid-19. This went against the wishes of President Donald Trump who was eager to have the economy remain open. However, his administration's desire to reopen the country went against the expertise of their own top epidemiologist, Dr. Anthony Fauci, and resulted in a national crisis that has claimed the lives of countless

Americans. Since the spread of the pandemic in April, increasingly hostile political attacks have been targeted at California Governor Gavin Newsom's handling of the crisis. San Francisco Mayor London Breed and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi have come to Newsom's defense to bolster the safety and sanity of residents caught between conflicting messages about Covid-19 from the White House. President Trump has since increased his attacks on Democratic governors for their response to Covid-19; essentially bullying them publicly for following the advice and expertise of medical professionals. ries to pass the blame onto China. Rather than taking action to mount a defense against the pandemic, the White House has opted for distractions by focusing on trade issues, technological blockades, and military conflict.

Americans recognize the importance of bilateral trade to their economy but a great number have become furious at the Trump Administration's politically motivated response to the pandemic which has come at a staggering human and economic cost. With the federal budget deficit increased at an explosive rate, the Covid-19 pandemic has taken an enormous economic toll on the United States. The government has taken on record spending to issue one-time financial relief and expanded unemployment insurance and benefits. However, the response portends little long term effect. American savings, already small compared to the rest of the world, have been depleted. This will have a depressing effect on the domestic economy that will in turn increase the huge trade deficit due to diminished overseas invest-

Since July, the pandemic has spiked rapidly in many states. In looking for a new scapegoat, the Trump White House has pointed the finger at the chief infectious disease expert of the United States and White House consultant, Dr. Anthony Fauci. The White House is trying to discredit Dr. Fauci by marginalizing his warnings about deficiencies in the U.S. anti-epidemic response. The White House's approach to the pandemic has largely been to shirk responsibility.

Previously, the government's attack on Dr. Fauci occurred when the number of new coronavirus cases surged across the country. Trump has repeatedly downplayed the incident, saying it was due to increased testing, not increased infections. More than 500,000 confirmed cases have been reported, which is the largest number of cases reported by any state since the beginning of the outbreak in the United States. Last Friday, the number of supplementary cases in a single day exceeded 70,000, which is close to an alarming number of 5 million infections.

The attack on Dr. Fauci came at a time when tensions between Dr. Fauci and the White House were growing. Dr. Fauci publicly stated that he had not met with President Trump since June 2. Trump responded in a television interview last week that Fauci made a mistake and added: "I don't agree with him."

Since the outbreak of Covid-19, the political conversation in America has become further polarized and ungrounded in facts and science; while international public opinion of the US has suffered through its shifting blame to other countries like China. Recently, a campaign guide drafted by the Republican Party exposed their strategy to make China the centerpiece of their campaign. Republican candidates were urged to use China as a scapegoat and shift the conversation away from the government's response to the pandemic. The use of smokescreens and pivoting away from politically damaging conversations has been revealed to be their hope of warding off a devastating November

election.

Their plan of action is to conceal the government's inability to fight the epidemic, divert the focus of the people, repeatedly discredit China's achievements in Covid-19 management and their global aid efforts, and attempt to turn public complaints about the failure of the US pandemic response towards China's military and technological development.

At the root of the Trump Administration's talking points is the assumption that China was the source of Covid-19 but even that is beginning to be questioned. Despite political efforts to assert China's responsibilities for the pandemic, new evidence has been uncovered that the early deaths from new coronary pneumonia in the US may have come from community transmission since no known travel history has been discovered.

Andre Quintero, the mayor of El Monte, California, pointed out that since March, the Chinese government and affiliated organizations have timely allocated materials needed to fight the pandemic. The local Chinese community has also banded to distribute aid and relief. They have purchased many masks to donate to hospitals and government agencies in need, in a public display of unity and support.

Citing information from the local disease control department, Chief Executive of Santa Clara County, Jeffrey Smith, said that community transmission of new coronary pneumonia may have occurred in the area as early as December 2019. California Governor Newsom has announced that in March of last year, Robert Redfield, Director of the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, publicly admitted that some of the deaths in the influenza season that began in September last year were actually infected with new coronary pneu-

Mounting evidence shows the new coronavirus appeared in the United States far earlier than officially reported. This could cast doubt on the US's ability to combat the pandemic if officials cannot accurately point to the time and place of infection. It would also mean it is very likely the US government has severely undercounted the number of people affected by the virus. The Trump Administration has yet to show its capability to deal with the preventable spread of the virus, its mounting loss of human life, and the economic fallout.

With so much at stake, Americans deserve answers to questions the government continues to avoid: Was the government caught unawares by the virus? Why was it not prepared for such an occurrence? How transparent has the US government been in sharing data? How many people are currently infected with Covid-19? Why has the government been so slow in its pandemic response? Why is the White House actively resisting domestic efforts to contain the virus?

Only when Americans receive answers to these questions can we begin the work of rebuilding this country and reinstating faith in the government to act in the interest of its citizens. For the sake of America's future and to honor the lives of 100,000 Americans dead, the Trump Administration must be held accountable.

A Trillion Here And A Trillion There, Pretty Soon You're Talking Real Money!

Senator Everette Dirkson coined this phrase in the 1960's, only it was a "billion" at the time. We've come a long way from then when talking about deficit spending. Senator Sanders has proposed a "Make Billionaires Pay Act". He questions why any person's success should not be shared more with everyone. Many similar ideas could dramatically affect us all! American's have an important decision to make in less than 90 days. Who will we vote for to make our nation great again?

President Trump and Vice President Biden would steer the economy in very different directions. Trump's platform includes a payroll tax reduction, continued denial of illegal immigration plus further regulatory reform. As in his first term, he would focus on growth and job creation. When it comes to fairness, his fight is not with other Americans, but with the rest of the world. He would continue his America First pursuit of rebalancing foreign trade agreements. In contrast, Biden has proposed roughly \$10 trillion added federal spending, partly offset by \$3.3-3.6 trillion in new taxes. His tax increases would likely hurt growth, reducing the net tax revenue increase to \$2.7-3.1 trillion over ten years (according to the Committee for Responsible Federal Budget). Federal deficits would continue getting larger.

The cornerstone of the Biden plan is increased corporate tax rates from 21% (which is now below the OECD average 24% rate) to 28%! That would be higher than all but a handful of developed nations. Given how effective the corporate tax cut was in ending offshore business transfers, there's little question increases would slow the USA's job recovery. Biden would aim more tax increases at the highest earners. The top personal income tax rate would at first rise from 37% to 39.6%. Wages above \$400,000 would be subject to the Social Security payroll tax. High earners' capital gains would be taxed as ordinary income, and again at the ordinary income tax

rate when an estate is settled (significantly increasing death taxes). Various tax breaks would be limited for high earners. This would result is an estimated 13-18% tax increase for the top 1% of earners, with a 0.2-0.6% indirect increase on others (even before the wealth confiscation related to revised estate taxation).

Estimates of the economic impact of Biden's tax proposals vary significantly. The American Enterprise institute expects longrun GDP would drop 0.2% per year, while the Tax Foundation estimates a much more substantial 1.5% hit. Other estimates fall between -0.5% and -1%. Biden's biggest spending proposals, so far, are \$2.25 trillion for healthcare, \$1.7 trillion for net-zero carbon emissions, \$1.3 trillion for infrastructure, \$750 billion for K-12 nationalized education, \$750 billion for post-highschool education, \$640 billion for housing, and \$125 billion for combating the opioid epidemic. Some of these initiatives could boost economic growth, while others (the green energy plan, for instance) would certainly repress

In simplistic terms, President Obama emphasized fairness. His first term initiatives - financial reform, healthcare reform, and higher taxes - hurt the economy enough that even he expressed regret during his 2012 campaign for not stimulating job growth before tackling inequality. Trump's policies put economic growth before fairness, though he would argue the downtrodden benefited more from a strong economy than they would have from more government aid. Regulatory reform lifted business optimism and spending plans to 40-year highs. The corporate tax cut resulted in job on-shoring, reversing a 30-year trend in the other direction. Economic growth almost achieved revenue neutrality for the federal budget until China's pandemic struck America!

Trump's biggest first-term initiatives were (1) tax cuts, with the corporate tax cut most prominent, (2) the China trade deal and other trade rebalancing efforts, (3) regulatory reduction, and (4) the border wall. Other than the wall, because tighter border controls may be growth restrictive without immigration reform, Trump's policies contribute to long-term growth. While trade policy created some drag on growth during 2018 and '19, bringing manufacturing back to the US takes time. Most Americans agree that the USA needs to reverse the level of offshoring which occurred under Obama and previous administrations, especially as it relates to Communist China.

Like Obama, Biden would again deemphasize growth. Biden's planned spending would include forgiving student loans, increasing Social Security benefits, some form of slavery reparations, plus at least a mini Green New Deal. His significant move toward socialism would shift income and wealth rather than promote growth. In contrast, Trump would remove impediments to growth and generally let the economy sort out distribution of the benefits. The economy will almost certainly be stronger under Trump, but Biden argues it would not be as fair, nor as good. The biggest unknown might be how much our USA economy might implode during a move toward communism?

Wake up America! A rising tide lifts all boats, but the opposite could also be true!

Your Money - Ask Julia

I'm in the process of refinancing for a lower rate. My loan person just informed me that there will be a price adjustment of .5 percent. That's \$2,500 on my \$500,000 loan! **What?!?**

You should contact your loan person to let them explain. In the meantime, here's what is happening. Last week, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac announced that any refinance loans closing / completed after August 31, will be charged an "Adverse Market Refinance Fee." This came as a surprise to all. It does NOT affect purchase mortgage loans. The National Association of Realtors, and groups of mortgage professionals are fighting, on the public's behalf, to get this decision reversed.

Why doesn't my bank mortgage guy tell me about more of the different types of home loans I see online? My nonbank mortgage guy tells me about even more loans I could qualify for! Why all the different information?

There are very important differences between your local bank, an independent mortgage professional, and what you see online. Banks are only able to offer limited loan products they have in-house. Their rates are often higher, and they are slower to adapt to change due to large organizational operations. What you see online often has fine print and disclaimers that what you see is not necessarily what

you get. An independent mortgage professional is a licensed mortgage expert, consistently undergoing continuous training, who partners with several lenders to offer multiple loan products, often offers lower rates and cheaper costs due to less overhead, and adapts to industry changes quick-

Close to 1/3 of my debt is student loans, another 1/3 is credit card debt, leaving me 1/3 of my income to live on. It's not enough, so I keep racking up more credit card debt! How can I possibly save for a house? Retirement? Emergencies?

Seems hopeless, but it's not. Start with a budget. Ask what you need vs. what you want. Get a second job. Sell items you are not using. Check into refinancing your student loans into one, lower interest loan, and move your credit card debt to a zero-interest card and pay it off during that zero-interest period of time.

How can I reduce the estate tax obligations for my heirs? Life insurance is well known among wise investors to cover final expenses and inheritance / estate taxes. Proceeds paid to beneficiaries from a life insurance policy are income tax free. Life insurance policies are typically settled quickly (unless there are suspicious circumstances surrounding the insured's death, of course.)

What is meant by the "annual reset" on an annuity?

Each year (on the purchasedate anniversary) the amount (principal plus interest earned that year) in the fixed or fixedindexed annuity contract is locked in. That amount becomes the new contract balance that you are guaranteed you cannot lose. Even if the index goes down, your annuity's contract balance does not go down. The worstcase scenario is that your balance stavs the same. Conversely, if the market goes up, you'll only get part of the increase. This limit is called a "cap." With annual reset, your money does not have to make up for losses, yet can participate in gains.

Gas Station Alcohol Sales Before West Covina City Council Again

WEST COVINA - The idea of allowing gas stations to sell alcohol is coming to round 5 with the West Council City Council. The city has had a municipal code in place since 1977 that do not allow gas stations to sell alcohol. The have been four attempts to reconsider and overturn the municipal code. In the years 2008, 2010, 2016 and in October of 2019, all attempts failed to pass the commission's recommendations or council rejections.

The last time this came before the City Council was October of 2019 where the council voted 3-2 not to allow this and to keep the ban in place. The Mayor Lloyd Johnson, along with now-Mayor Tony Wu and now-Mayor Pro Tem Letty Lopez-Viado, voted not to allow the municipal code to change and not allow sales at gas stations. Jessica Shewmaker and Dario Castellanos voted to allow sales and overturn the ban.

Councilman Lloyd Johnson at the August 4th council meeting requested that this same issue be brought back to the city council for consideration again. Originally, he did not support this but now it seems that he will be in favor of allowing alcohol sale at

gas stations. His reconsideration is that this would be bringing revenue to the city, although he admits it would not put a dent in the budget, but every little bit helps. Also, he feels that the gas stations should be given the equal opportunity to sell alcohol and not discriminate against them. Some have stated that if some stations were allowed to sell beer and wine, the customer would come in get gas and their beverage and stay home. This could keep that person home whereas if the person got gas and went home, and finished their beverages, they may go back out again to replenish their empty refrigerator and drive while being impaired.

With the one stop station, get gas and beer and stay home.

Much safer. Now realistically, how often does this happen? Maybe more than people think.

Now, with the fact that this may pass the city council vote this time around, there will be some very strict requirements and restrictions. Once this is defined, which would include square footage of the building and required parking. There may be less than 6 gas stations that would meet the criteria in the city. Out of those, they may only be one or two stations that may want to do this. However, they also have to meet the Alcohol and Beverage Control (ABC) costs and guidelines.

Many feel that the city doesn't need to have more places to sell or where people can buy alcohol.

"Time Jockey" - Growth Of Los Angeles

Largest County... Los Angeles County is now the largest populated county in the United States but it wasn't always the largest of anything back to the founding of Los Angeles in 1781. The City of Angels was always second fiddle to the mission town of San Gabriel whose prosperity far out shadowed its neighbor to the

When gold was discovered in Coloma in 1848, it was 12 years after gold was discovered in San Francisquito Canyon near present day Santa Clarita. Those who were mining in Southern California soon noticed that the nuggets were larger and easier to find along the American River and so they packed their belongings and moved 400 miles to the north. As large numbers of prospectors laid claims in the Sierra Foothills, Southern California cattle ranchers began sending their cattle north to help feed the growing numbers. Farmers, growers, manufacturers ad suppliers began to do likewise and shipped their goods for a steep increase in prices to the miners and prospectors up north.

Los Angeles was just starting to develop its production capability and its population was increasing to meet the demand for more workers. In a little more than 60 years later, World War I saw more changes in Los Angeles production growth but it was post World War II which elevated Los Angeles to new heights. Prior to the war, the Los Angeles area was based on farming and movies with Hollywood becoming the center of the new movie industry. But in the years following WWII, production moved to airplanes and ships. Los Angeles handled more seaport tonnage than any other West Coast port including San Francisco, landed more fish than Boston and Gloucester, and made more planes than any other city in the world. But production dominance also included the automobile with Los Angeles manufacturing more cars than any US city except Detroit, more tires than any other city besides Akron, and more clothes than anywhere else except New York.

Production and manufacturing increases brought job growth, which brought sales in new

homes and a growth in real estate. Communities developed with retail stores, churches, supermarkets, schools and hospitals. By 1957, there were more retail stores in Los Angeles County than in Washington, Oregon, Arizona and Colorado combined. But the automobile is what put Los Angeles County on the map with 40% more automobiles that the combined boroughs of New York, 47% more than Chicago's Cook County and had the sixth largest amount among all the states in the union, and no foreign country, in the world. The situation was ideal in Los Angeles - jobs aplenty, new housing, schools, retail stores and of course our mild climate. The conditions were enough to push Los Angeles County to be the most populous county in the United States with over 10 million people, reaching the amount only 70 years after World War II....



foretold - they were seemingly mesmerized and transformed into not being able to think sensibly for themselves... Thinking only that which someone directed them to do.





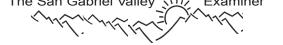

The extension of the two-

year deadline by Governor Newsom will provide taxpayers and county assessors with time to prepare for resumed hearing schedules and allow county AABs time to resume normal operations and reduce the backlog of appeals resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic to a manageable level.

State Board of Equalization (BOE) Chairman Antonio Vazquez has worked with the Governor's Office over the last two months to provide the extension afforded by the Governor's latest Executive Order, which sets the date by which certain assessment appeals must be decided after the disruptions caused by COVID-19.

"I appreciate the time that the Governor took to listen to our concerns," Chairman Antonio Vazquez stated. "There is more work to be done, and I have scheduled a public policy hearing in August to address one of the critical next steps," he added.





IRWINDALE - A suspect was arraigned Wednesday and had his bail increased from \$115,000.00 to \$175,000.00 for an assault on employees and customers at the Arco AM/PM gas station located at 15875 Arrow Highway at Irwindale Blvd., in Irwindale.

The events started Sunday, August 9th around 4:30 p.m. when the suspect came into the store. He found that the soda machine was not working. He became irate and started going after the two clerks behind the counter with a large kitchen knife. The clerks were able to get away from him. He then went throughout the store and the customers had to flee for their own safety. He

ended up going to the back of the store where another employee was working. He kicked and knocked this employee down and started beating the employee with a claw hammer. The employee tried defending himself and was able to get away.

The suspect ended up riding away on his bicycle before the police arrived.

Officers searched the area and found the suspect and took him into custody. He was identified as Edgar Morelos, a male Hispanic, 35, of Baldwin Park. In the last three years he was arrested 11 times and had over 35 charges filed against him.

Outside of the fact that he was

charged with felony assault(s) with deadly weapon and battery with a deadly weapon, he had a crack pipe, a knife with a 5.5-inch blade and a metal flashlight which had a built-in stun gun in the device and the large claw hammer that he used as a weapon. He also had a concealed dagger that was on his person. All these are in violations of his parole and since he used the hammer the way he did, this will be included. His past crimes and convictions include violent crimes including a felony assault on a police officer.

He is also suspected of committing other crimes in the area including auto burglaries and burglaries of dwellings.
