PASADENA - When it comes to January 1 in Pasadena, CA, there is a very high probability the sun will break through and provide weather the entire country wishes it could experience to start the new year. The forecast of a cool yet sunny day this year increased the size of the crowd of thousands lining Colorado Boulevard. Everyone was excited awaiting the start of the 131st Rose Parade.

The Rose Parade with its theme "The Power Of Hope" started as the opening spectacular presented by Honda commenced on Orange Grove Blvd. in front of the television networks broadcasting around the world. The opening theme "Reach For The Stars" featured one of the biggest and most popular Latin Reggaeton artists in the world - Farruko and the sultry voiced singer Ally Brooke, the break-out star of all girl group Fifth Harmony.

Home Fire Risks Increase As Weather Cools

The fall and winter seasons bring cooler temperatures, holidays, and images of cozy nights by the fireplace. Yet the change in seasons also comes with the chance of severe weather and an increase in fire risks. According to the U.S. Fire Administration, more home fires occur in winter than in any other season.

"Space heaters, generators, and fireplaces all present fire hazards if not properly used and maintained," said Steve Hirsch, chair of the National Volunteer Fire Council. "Residents should be aware of the dangers and take the steps to make sure their families and homes are protected."

Follow these tips to minimize home fire and safety risks:

- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home. Test monthly to ensure they work.
- Install carbon monoxide alarms and test them at least once
- Know where the gas, electric, and water main shut-off controls are and how to use them.
- Place fire extinguishers in the kitchen, garage, and living room, and make sure all household members know how to use
- Develop a home fire escape plan and practice it with the entire family.
- Keep portable generators outside and away from the home.
- Install a screen in front of each fireplace or wood stove. Store cooled ashes in a metal container outside the home.
- · Have chimneys professionally inspected and cleaned every



- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from fireplaces, radiators, space heaters, or other heat source.
- Never leave lit candles unattended, and keep them out of the reach of children and pets.

Residents can also take an active role in protecting their communities from hazards such as fires, medical emergencies, and much more. Fire departments across the country are looking for volunteers to serve as firefighters, EMS providers, and auxiliary members.

"The majority of firefighters

in the U.S. are volunteers neighbors helping neighbors in an incredible and rewarding way," said Hirsch. "We need more people to answer the call to serve."

Training is provided by the department, and volunteers can serve in a variety of roles, from providing life-saving emergency response services to conducting fire prevention programs and disaster preparedness planning.

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Does your child have a digital device? They are in good company. Fifty-three percent of children own a smartphone by age 11, and 84 percent of teenagers have their own phones, according to Common Sense Media.

While there are many great benefits to being digitally connected at a young age, there are certain issues families should address. Consider these suggestions for safer, more responsible mobile device use:

1) Discuss Privilege and Trust. Have a casual, openended chat about the privilege and responsibilities of device ownership. Ask questions about whether their friends own devices, and what they're most excited to use it for.

2) Set Clear Agreements. Setting clear rules about device usage is essential. Depending on your child's age, you may agree that the device only to be used for certain purposes (for example: contacting you, FaceTiming relatives, doing homework). Even with older kids and teens, it's important to discuss appropriate online behavior, healthy digital habits and "screen etiquette." Consider putting together a "contract" to be displayed somewhere visible.

3) Buy a Protective Case and Warranty. Devices are easy to lose or break -- especially by kids. Consider buying a durable case and screen protector as additional presents, and definitely purchase a warranty through your carrier or a third party. Finally, make sure you have a location monitoring app installed on your child's device, which offers peace of mind, saves headaches coordinating pickups and can help you locate lost devices in a pinch.

4) Download a Parental Guidance App. Download a parental guidance app onto your own device, such as

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


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

Residents are warned to STOP VAPING NOW

LOS ANGELES COUNTY death associated with e-ciga--The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) continues to warn residents about the use of vaping and e-cigarette devices as potentially harmful to proper lung function and urges residents to STOP VAPING NOW. Nationally, there continue to be reports of people showing up in emergency departments with similar symptoms such as coughing, difficulty breathing, fever, and may have vomiting and diarrhea. And while the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention identified Vitamin E acetate as a potential chemical of concern, the cause for this threat remains unknown.

Los Angeles County Cases: • As of January 2, 2020,

there is one new reported case, bringing the total to 36 cases of serious vaping- associated pulmonary injury, and one

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Annual Independent Evaluation of the Homeless Initiative Shows Los **Angeles County is Making an Impact**

LOS ANGELES COUNTY-

Los Angeles County is housing more people than ever before as it confronts a large and growing homelessness crisis, a new independent performance evaluation

The annual performance evaluation assessed outcomes in fiscal year 2018-19, known as Year Three, of a comprehensive set of strategies approved by the Board of Supervisors in 2016 and carried out by the County's Homeless Initiative with partners throughout the region.

The Year Three assessment found that the Homeless Initiative placed nearly 10,000 individuals and families in permanent housing last year—an increase of 25% over placements made by the Initiative in the previous year, accounting for close to half of the more than 20,000 placements made by the County's homeless services system over-

At the same time, fewer people are returning to homelessness after being placed in permanent housing, the evaluation found. The rate of return to homelessness dropped to 5.9% in Year Three, compared to 9.2% the vear before.

In addition, the Homeless Initiative placed nearly 20,000 individuals and family members in interim housing during Year Three—an increase of approximately 27% over Year Two placements.

The independent, annual performance evaluation of the Homeless Initiative was conducted by Public Sector Analytics and submitted to the Board of Supervisors on January 6, 2020 by the County's Chief Executive Office.

Despite a 12% year-over-year increase in the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority's annual point-in-time homeless

count for 2019, the Homeless Initiative's Year Three performance was "effective and successful," the researchers said.

The 2019 homeless count was "driven higher by the continuation of an upward trend in the housing market, which has pushed rents to levels increasingly out of alignment with incomes," the evaluation said. "The forces driving this dynamic are largely outside the policy purview of the homeless services system and should not obscure the [Homeless Initiative's] important Year Three accomplishments."

The evaluation credited Measure H, the landmark 1/4-cent sales tax approved by voters in 2017, with helping Los Angeles County avoid the much larger increases in homelessness reported by other Southern California counties last year.

Duarte Public Safety/Essential Services Measure Receives Official **Designation from L.A. County**

DUARTE - The City Council voted unanimously on Tuesday, November 26 to place a threequarters of a cent sales tax measure on the March 3, 2020 ballot to help preserve public safety and community programs. L.A. County has designated the item Measure D.

Measure D - The Duarte Public Safety/Essential Services Measure is a response to the City's growing need to maintain long-term financial stability. If approved by a majority of Duarte's voters, this measure would take the City's existing sales tax from the current rate 9.5 percent to 10.25 percent, generating approximately \$2.6 million per

year in local revenue. All funds would be used to benefit Duarte residents - no funds could be taken by the State, County or other

If approved by the voters, this local funding would:

• Prevent cuts to emergency response, public safety

• Retain neighborhood Sheriff's patrols and crime suppression/investigation

 Maintain streets, roads and repairing potholes, so they don't become more costly to fix in the future

• Keep parks, trails, sports fields and facilities in good con-



Without additional revenues, the City will need to evaluate cutting close to 10 percent of its overall City budget by June 2020.

Arcadia, Glendora, Irwindale, Monrovia, Sierra Madre and other neighboring cities have already passed a sales tax to keep revenues locally controlled. Alhambra, Azusa, La Verne, San Gabriel, San Dimas and West Covina have placed a similar sales tax measure on the March 2020 ballot to protect city services.

'TIME JOCKEY' - Transition

Law and Order... Happy New Year! It's 2020 and the beginning of a new year and a new decade. Like most everyone else its time to clean out the old stuff and start with something new. I began with reviewing my old history notes which I encountered years ago but as its still history, and is still applicable today thus it's as good a time as any to write

1850 was the biggest year in California's history. The transition of California from Mexican to American rule was not as safe and sane as many people may have thought and came with a number of challenges. Mexico had a legal system based on civil law while the United States legal system was based on common law. I'm not a lawyer but the primary difference is common law allows a judge to be actively involved in setting the rules and overseeing the proceeding while civil law follows fixed codes and statutes. The Mexican judicial system has no jury and no trial but an alcalde presiding over the case.

The two most significant events which caused a wide breach in the Mexican-American relationship was the Mexican-American War and the Gold

Rush. California was the Siberia of Mexico, its governing body was located as much as 2,000 miles away in Mexico City. When the War with Mexico ended, it left California with a vacuum of authority. When the United States offi-

cially took control over California in 1850, the Gold Rush was just beginning to grow. Gold and immigration brought a record number of people into California, and they weren't all the best of people. A criminal element flocked to the gold fields to take advantage of the fact that for nearly three years there was no formal government established in California which also had a legal and police enforcement system. Murders were a commonplace occurrence with a murdera-day taking place in Los Angeles. The first "official" criminal in Los Angeles was Tiburcio Vasquez, who committed many crimes along the Monterey coast and eventually made his way to Southern California. Vasquez performed his last crime in the Repetto Hills, was caught, sentenced and hanged in 1875 in San Jose. The last lynching in Los Angeles County took place at

Workman Mill in 1874. By the time Los Angeles had

reached a population of 15,000, only 6 policemen were working to maintain law and order of the surging population. Vigilante groups were organized, like the Monte Boys in El Monte, who enforced their own brand of law and order. The city of Los Angeles was broken into different ethnic groups and maintained their were own type of law. The Anglo-Americans were dominate in Los Angeles, especially south of downtown. The Mexican families were established in the northern part of Los Angeles, with the area around present day Dodger Stadium known as Sonora Town. The Chinese also settled north of downtown but were more often forced to move so they dug underground tunnels for hiding and escaping. A young California, lawless Los Angeles and a population growth rate which surpassed all expectations brought challenges not previously known and a new meaning to the term "Wild Wild West"....

A Few New Rules for 2020

Happy New Year to all as we roll into the new year with eyes on D.C. and the legislature as it goes back into session. A review of the past year always seems to be a wake-up call, especially when it is once again an election year.

We are no longer allowed to smoke or do any vaping at our California state beaches or parks and if we try and get caught, the fine is \$25. The court is permitted to assign the violator mandatory community service time probably to pick up trash or old cigar or cigarette left-overs. California State Parks Department is required to develop and post signs in appropriate locations at a cost estimated to be \$1.12 million for 5,600 signs; estimated one-time State Parks costs of \$700,000 for CEQA compliance and \$228,000 for Coastal Commission permits; and, minor costs for Department of Justice costs associated with enforcing the smoking ban. Those dollar signs seem a little outrageous to me.

California has done it again with another first in the nation. All new homes built in 2020 or later must be solar powered. **Building Standards Commission** action was reinforced by the California Energy Commission supporting that mandate. Energy officials estimated an additional cost of \$10,000 for completing this solar addition to each new home with cost recovery of that investment by the home purchaser expected over a 20-year time frame. Long time on a mortgage payment with interest.

However, additional green homebuilding standards like thicker attic and wall insulation, energy efficient windows and doors and improved ventilation systems with a couple of other home accessory items like heat pump water systems run the price of a new home much higher. Butte County Treasurer-Tax Collector, Peggy Moak, estimated the cost of just the solar panels running \$25,000. 300 opposition letters were received along with a letter from Assemblyman James Gallagher, R-Yuba City who said,

"With median home prices in California already more than double the national average, this decision will make it even more difficult for the average Californian to afford a home."

I have mixed feelings about exotic animals at a circus but new state law in California now allows only dogs, cats and domesticated horses in circuses in this state. Rodeos are exempt. This new law levels a \$25,000 fine a day for violators.

California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) would be in charge of monitoring and enforcement of circuses, with one new person to the payroll at \$170,000 a year from the general fund and \$146,000 for investigation and enforcement. Department of Justice estimates it would need an added \$36,000 first year, and \$76,000 annually ongoing from the general fund and Legal Services Revolving Fund.

Another California first: We are now entering a period of monitoring our indoor water usage per Assembly Bill 1668 and Senate Bill 606 and Gov. Jerry Brown's Executive Order. As of January 1st, State Department of Water Resources and Water Resources Control Board will have submitted to the state legislature their analysis of our progress on 55 gallons only of indoor water use and conservation. They are preparing to report back to the state legislature in 2021 with recommendations on how we consumers are doing and if we will be able to meet our 52.5-gallon standard in 2025 and then 50 gallons in 2030. Problems came in fast and furious.

• How do water agencies determine what is indoor use and what is outdoor use? The simple answer is two meters - one for the outside and one for the inside water use. And who pays for meters and modifications? We all know the answer to that question.

• How will the agencies know how many people live in the house unless they go out and do a head count? Or rely on the every 10-year census count by volunteers?

• Smart meters can already monitor your water usage by each day and almost by the hour. State Water Resources Control Board reported in 2017 the average Californian was using 90 gallons of water a day. Using that number and calculating one half of that as indoor use, means the 50-gallon limit was met. And indoor use is far lower than outdoor irrigation use.

• \$30 billion in water bonds approved in this state leaving a big question -- where did all that bond money go, and how much additional water capacity has been achieved?

• October 2018 to September 2019, an amount of water equal to a year's supply for 275 million people flowed out to the Pacific Ocean according to California Globe.

We've all heard for the last 20 to 25 years about the 3-R's - Reduce, Reuse, Recycle - to minimize waste and maximize landfill space. What happens when the largest recycling operator decides to close his 284 centers and layoff almost 1,000 employees?

Consumer Watchdog says the last 5 years consumers have been paying that nickel a can or bottle but not getting that money back because of fewer redemption centers. \$308 million in 2018 was never redeemed according to the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery. Consumer Watchdog report says that number is closer to \$732 million. Wonder what happens to that unclaimed money?

Presidential Timber

The nation's preoccupation with impeachment is being resolved in a way that will leave no one satisfied. But perhaps this provides the opportunity to take a deeper look at the sort of person this nation deserves to sit in the Oval Office. Whether or not Donald Trump committed impeachable acts may not define the problem. In November's Atlantic, Jeffery Goldberg put it this way; "The 45th President of the United States is uniquely unfit for office and possesses a multifaceted threat to our country's democratic institutions."

Christianity Today (The voice reflecting Billy Graham's take on evangelicalism since 1967) in its December 19th edition put it in uncharacteristic harsh language after a blazing condemnation of Trump's moral depravity and a call for his removal from office – The reason many are not shocked about this is that this president has dumbed down the idea of morality in his administration. He has hired and fired a number of people who are now convicted criminals. He himself has admitted to immoral actions in business and his relationship with women, about which he remains proud. His Twitter feed alone with its habitual string of mischaracterizations, lies, and slanders—is a near perfect example of a human being who is morally lost and confused.

Here is the President who recently was forced to pay a two million dollar fine for fraud by diverting contributions to his personal use from his charity that raises funds for children suffering from cancer. What sort of person steals money raised to help sick kids?

Decades ago, there was common a phrase that attempted to define whether a potential candidate was qualified to be President. "Was he made of Presidential timber?" Those who did not

meet this undefined test were written off. What test? Supreme Court Justice Potter said that he knew pornography when he saw it. If somebody was fit to be President, would not the people almost immediately know it? This did not mean that the potential candidate had an inside track on the nomination let alone the election, only that he might be qualified.

This test had little to do with her/his political opinions or party affiliation. It was rather a lived-out honesty, dignity, valor, nobility of character, respect, truthfulness—the sort of person even children would be drawn to respect, as would the leaders and people of other nations. The American people would know Presidential timber when they saw it. Beyond any political affiliation we would view such a person with enormous respect.

We have tended to elect candidates we knew "fit," even if we could not define just what that meant. Woodrow Wilson was such a person as were Herbert Hoover and FDR. Harry Truman just made it but Thomas Dewey, he defeated, was clearly Presidential Timber. Dwight Eisenhower made the grade as did Ronald Reagan, Jimmy Carter and the first George Bush. Bill Clinton had it to start with, but lost it in his fun and games in the oval office. Barak Obama was a stirling example. Every passing day saw Richard Nixon shed any sturdy image he might have carried, and George W Bush turned out to be the shrub his detractors had labelled him.

In this column I will not attempt to characterize the Democratic candidates, even if all those who remain appear to make the grade. As the convention draws closer, who is Presidential timber and who is not will become increasingly obvious.

But let's get back to the realestate mogul who has put his name on golf courses, hotels, casinos and office buildings around the world. With the same significant sales ability he put his brand on the Republican Party he now totally controls. To this political base he has added evangelical Christians whose support I find it impossible to understand, and a collection of others I hesitate to categorize. The question remains, is Donald Trump Presidential timber? If so, where is the morality, the dignity, the graciousness, the honor, valor, nobility and capacity to remold the nation into a "more perfect union." Are these not the qualities and character the American people have a right to expect?

Donald Trump was impeached by the House of Representatives but seems certain to survive conviction by a Senate he owns, and whose members would be committed to him no matter what he might do. The issue is not whether he should have been impeached, but whether he is fit to the President. That question now goes to the American people who will decide in November.

So while we cannot define what it means for someone to be presidential timber, every day it becomes clearer that Donald Trump in not made of sturdy planks but of moldy straw.


MY TURN: Climate Change Or Otherwise... Just More Hysteria To Promote Socialism





Democrats Vote Down Election Integrity Measure

SACRAMENTO - Senate Democrats killed Senate Bill 57 in the Senate Elections and Constitutional Amendments Committee. SB 57 would have helped to fix the Democrats' failed Motor Voter program. Authored by Senator Patricia Bates (R-Laguna Niguel) and co-authored by members of the California Senate Republican Caucus, SB 57 would have made voter registration optional at the DMV. Since the Motor Voter program has been implemented, multiple media outlets have reported on inaccurate party registrations and the registration of non-U.S. citi-

Senate Republican Leader Shannon Grove: "Legislative Republicans have warned Democrats about the flawed Motor Voter program. Since its implementation, there have been nonstop problems. Election integri-

ty is imperative to a fair democracy. Let's be clear this vote by Senate Democrats was against election integrity."

Senator Patricia Bates: "Given that the Secretary of State's office and the DMV have underplayed well-documented problems with automatic registration, today's outcome was not a surprise. The decision to register to vote should be made by the individual - not the state. Those who oppose my bill fail to appreciate that an 'opt-in' process gives citizens more control over their own voter registrations and reduces opportunities for errors and fraud. I will continue to fight for election integrity, including working with my colleagues to make a simple fix to provide clarity to customers who visit DMV offices."

Senator Ling Ling Chang: "Our voter registration process is key to successful elections at every level of representative government. If the people cannot trust that process, then the integ-

rity of our democracy is damaged. Tens of thousands of people have been affected by software errors and false party registration. It's imperative we act swiftly on this matter to restore faith in our democratic elections."

Senator Mike Morrell: "Thousands of Californians have had their voter registrations changed against their wishes. Automatic motor voter was misguided from the start and is clearly broken. SB 57 is straightforward and sensible. Senate Democrats' failure to recognize these blatant problems risks the voting rights of all Californians."

Senator Scott Wilk: "The DMV is hardly the appropriate place to register voters - especially while it infamously struggles to handle its own mission. SB 57 would have put safeguards in place to protect voters from the endless chain of bureaucratic blunders and ensure people are able to exercise their right to vote."



It appears that the stock market continued to ignore the impeachment circus in Washington DC, as NASDAQ broke through 9000 for the first time, and the S&P as well as DOW continued to set all-time record highs. The more dysfunctional the House of Representatives becomes, the more the stock market seems to "like" beltway gridlock. Naturally, the House impeachment vote was intended to harm President Trump, who apparently could care less. The President just continued to do what he has promised (influencing the US economy in a positive way). At this writing House Speaker Nancy Pelosi still has not sent the impeachment articles to the Senate. Does she really think she can or will influence how the Senate

conducts its "trial"? Across the "pond" the European Union remains very nervous about Brexit finally happening on January 31st. Grumbling from both France and Germany is being ignored by Prime British Minister Boris Johnson, so a "no deal" Brexit is a possibility. France remains totally dysfunctional (with its nationwide strike over pension reform, with schools and trains closed, power outages, as well as hundreds of thousands of protestors). France certainly has no credibility to tell Britain what to do. Germany is a much better-run country, but it is now worried that without Britain (paying into the EU) other EU members will suffer (especially since those economies are currently weaker than when Brexit

was just a "what if" concern). Christmas Eve 2018's "Santa" appeared to be in a funk, as the DOW collapsed 653 points (down 2.9%). Retail sales were down 2.2% for the month, and the S&P 500 was down 15% through 12/24/18. However, at year-end 2019 the S&P was up 37% (in 12 months)! Was it more than a result of naughty vs. nice Federal Reserve policies? In 2018 the Fed probably raised interest rates one time too many, including early December. During 2019 they cut rates three times. That cer-

tainly was beneficial for the economy; but we should NOT discount President Trump's positive impact on 2019 valuation recoveries!

As 2019 ended we should also have been thankful that Phase One of the U.S. trade deal with China avoided an escalation of tariffs (at least for now)! Also, Congress finally passed Trump's negotiated USMCA (NAFTA replacement bill to open trade barriers with our two biggest trading partners, Mexico and Canada). The USM-CA may not seem to be a perfect bill for everyone (as it favors the job protectionism Trump savors); but, it "greases the skids" for needed cross-border trade going into 2020!

That's another reason the major stock market indexes kept hitting one new high after another on each Friday in December. U.S. business activity (according to the Purchasing Managers Index) also reached a five-month high in December, and that survey was conducted December 5-13, before these trade agreements were finalized.

Canada and Mexico remain our two biggest trading partners; and, most of our China trade is imports, not exports! The U.S. exports five times more to Mexico and Canada than to China. Economists say that the new USMCA deal will create hundreds of thousands of new jobs, and usher in a wave of prosperity for all three neighbor nations. How much more good news can

Surveys show that global growth should also revive in 2020 (after a year of "slowdown" warnings in major publications). Figures released recently by China's

National Bureau of Statistics (although always suspect) showed industrial output in November was 6.2% higher than a year earlier, up from 4.7% in October. China's retail sales reportedly climbed 8% in November from a year earlier (according to a separate report). The IMF now sees global growth at +3.4% next year, although the European Central Bank (ECB) sees Eurozone growth mired at the +1.1% level in 2020.

It is likely that President Trump will put his most flaming trade war rhetoric on "the back burner" as he strives to keep GDP growth and the stock market humming during 2020. While GDP growth may be seen by some as "stuck" in a 1%-4% channel since 2010, that's good news! The absence of "a blow-out inflationary boom" is beneficial. because such an overheated economy usually leads to a significant recession. Some businesses have "tailed off" during 2019, but others have enjoyed best ever years. It may be wishful thinking by the "fake news crazies" to think that Trump's "economic honeymoon" only lasted through 2018.

The recent rise in real wages plus the savings rate, along with the growing pile of cash on the sidelines, should fuel stock market expansion and rising retail sales in 2020. It's rational to expect real consumer spending to increase 2.5% in 2020, the same as 2019, with similar increasing GDP numbers (unless major trade disputes arise). A tight labor market should boost productivity, which would allow nominal wages to continue increasing faster than consumer prices, boosting consumers' purchasing power and spending growth. Historically, incumbents win when voters feel financially secure with "full pockets" and "buying power".

Your Money - Ask Julia

Write out 2020

When writing the date, we are all accustomed to abbreviating the year, but let me encourage you to write out 2020. This is especially important on checks and legal documents. For example, if you were to write 1/15/20, it would be relatively easy for that date to be altered to 1/15/ 2006, or 1/15/2016. An inaccurate date could make the document null and void.

What is the increase Medigap Part B premium and deductible for 2020?

The Social Security cost-ofliving adjustment (COLA) increase is 1.6-percent. For the majority, Part B premium increased by \$9.10, from \$135.50 in 2019 to \$144.60. And, Part B deductible increased by \$13, from \$185 in 2019 to \$198. Example: If you were receiving \$1,200 monthly for Social Security income, your monthly SS income would increase by 1.6-percent, becoming \$1,219.20; an increase of \$19.20. Part B premium and deductible increased by \$22.10 (\$9.10 plus \$13.) Many Prescription Drug plans (Part D) premiums also increased, some considerably.

Please explain inflation and recession.

Inflation is the increase in the price of products over time. Long-term inflation erodes your power to purchase. In other words, over time, your savings buys less; a dollar no longer buys what it could a few years ago. The factor to determine a Recession is when there has been two quarters (two 3-month periods of time) in a row of negative eco-

nomic growth.

Because we have a small downpayment, we are being told we have to pay mortgage insurance. Can you explain a little about the mortgage insurance?

Mortgage insurance is charged on any loan that has less than 20percent equity. The purpose of mortgage insurance is to pay the lender in case you fail to make your payments and have to foreclose. Different lenders charge different mortgage insurance premiums. There are non-FHA loans (Conventional) that allow a small downpayment (5-percent or even less). Depending on income and area, research information about Urban mortgage loans, too.

My mom is trying to decide whether to give her home to me now, or just have me inherit it upon her passing. What is the best thing to do?

It depends. Look at the difference between the Estate tax rate vs. the Capital Gains tax rate applicable in your mother's and your specific case. For example, if the estate tax rate is lower than capital gains tax, it would probably be better to wait. On the other hand, if the Estate tax rate would be higher than the capital gains tax, it could be better to take action now. Also, check with your CPA about the tax ramifications of gifting equity (rather than cash) up to the annual parent-tochild annual limit. (Keep in mind that life insurance is included in the value of one's estate when calculating estate tax.)


I have the option of taking all the money now out of my fixed annuity, without any early surrender charges. I like annuities. Although I don't plan to use the money, I might want to access it later. What do you suggest I do with this money?

Depending on your entire financial picture and what is best for you, I'd probably suggest either reinvesting in an annuity or purchasing a paid-up life insurance policy. Some company's products offer an option of almost immediate access to a good part of your money. Some policies offer penalty-free, accelerated access if you need the money for a nursing home. It really boils down to what you want your money to do for you and what is most suitable for you.

Trusts: Why a Will May Not Be Enough

of documenting how you will pass along your assets to your family and friends. But you're stuck: Should you use a trust or a will? Here are five considerations.

Trusts avoid probate; wills don't. Probate is the legal process estates generally have to go through. It typically involves lawyers, paperwork and fees. A trust avoids probate because assets are owned in the name of the trust and are immediately accessible to the trust maker's designated successor.

Trusts provide creditor protection for your inheritance. Your children's creditors, such as a divorcing spouse, unpaid credit card bills, bankruptcy or a business loss, can take a significant piece out of the inheritance. A trust allows you to safeguard the inheritance from creditors, as it keeps assets out of the beneficiary's name. Ownership of assets is in the trust, ensuring that the money is available to your kids and their kids.

Trusts protect government benefits for a beneficiary with disabilities. Have a child or

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you leave assets via a will, such benefits as Social Security and Medicaid can be lost. However, in a trust, the state is the beneficiary, and you ensure that the benefits continue to be available. Your inheritance will be available to pay for expenses not covered by governmental benefits. Trusts can administer as-

sets for minor beneficiaries without court intervention. The law says that a minor doesn't have the legal capacity to receive assets. The surviving parent doesn't have the ability to act as the child's legal representative until the court says so. Under a will, the court appoints a conservator to receive the inheritance for your children, and the conservator is required to report annually to the court to make sure the job is being handled well. There may be substantial costs, and long delays are inherent in administering funds for minors. However, by creating a trust to receive the assets that pass to a minor or young adult, you reduce court involvement. The person you deem able to manage the assets for the beneficiary is in charge. The beneficiary can use the assets only for purposes you decide are im-

tate. Of course, this is just a summary of the advantages of establishing trusts, and there are subtleties you need to get into before making a final decision. State laws may also make a dif-

How Much To Budget

AAA estimates maintenance costs at around 4 cents per mile driven, which means you should set aside \$50-60/month for this line item. Sadly, many put off service/maintenance and they end up having an expensive repair that could have been avoided. I then thought...maybe they don't realize how much it costs to maintain their vehicle annually. With that thought in mind I've decided to share with you something in print so you can fill in the blanks for yourself. 
- Keeping current with oil and filter changes prevents the need for a new engine.





These Behaviors Make You A Scam Target

If you spend a lot of time on social media sites or looking for great online deals, you may wear a bullseye when it comes to scammers hunting for prey, according to groundbreaking fraud research from the FINRA Investor Education Foundation, BBB Institute for Marketplace Trust and the Stanford Center on Longevity.

Researchers surveyed more than 1,400 Americans and Canadians who were targeted by scammers and reported the fraud to the Better Business Bureau (BBB), which tracks scams. Nearly half of those surveyed did not engage with the fraudster. However, 30 percent engaged to some degree but ultimately did not lose money, while 23 percent engaged with the fraudster or offer and lost money.

What separates victims from non-victims?

"The path to victimization begins with engagement," said FINRA Foundation President Gerri Walsh. "Social media and website scams are flourishing. Every time you respond to a friend request from someone you don't know or click through to an unfamiliar website, you run the risk of being exposed to a scam."

Your chance of falling victim to a scam varies by type—for instance, online purchase scams, tech support ploys, fake check or sweepstakes frauds—and by the method in which you are exposed to the offer. For those exposed to a scam through social media or a website, the numbers are chilling. When exposed to a scam on social media, 91 percent

engaged and 53 percent lost money. The odds of losing money to website scams were only slightly lower: 81 percent of consumers in the study who were exposed to a fraud via a website said they engaged—and 50 percent lost money.

Other factors heighten the likelihood of falling for a fraud. Consumers were more likely to be victimized if they were isolated and didn't have anyone to discuss the offer with, according to the study. Consequently, those who engaged scammers and lost money were less likely to be married and more likely to be widowed or divorced. "Sadly, loneliness and fraud victimization seem to go hand in hand," noted Walsh.

You're also more likely to engage and lose money if you're feeling financial strain, or have low levels of financial literacy, the study found.

Protect Yourself
Take these steps to protect

yourself from fraud:

• Ask for input from others. Scammers try to isolate their victims. Don't be afraid to contact a friend, or a company or organization you trust for advice. It also helps to do additional research before sending any money. One easy action: Do an Internet search to see if the website or pitch has been flagged as fraudulent or potentially fraudulent by news organizations or members of the public.

• Focus on your financial health and literacy. Individuals under financial strain and those with lower levels of financial literacy may be more susceptible to scammers.

• Knowledge is power. Knowing about scams and scammer tactics can be your best defense in successfully reducing the effect of scams. Keep up with the latest frauds by subscribing to consumer newsletters and seeking out information on current scams.

One-third of consumers who were targeted by a scammer, but did not engage with the offer, already knew about the specific type of scam. In addition, consumers who understood the tactics and behaviors of scammers tended not to engage with fraudsters.

Monrovia Unified Recognized With Golden Bell Award for Dual Enrollment Partnership with Citrus College

MONROVIA – Monrovia Unified's Early College Program (ECP), a dual-enrollment partnership with Citrus College that allows students to graduate from high school with up to two years of college coursework, has been recognized with a Golden Bell Award by the California School Boards Association (CSBA).

Superintendent Dr. Katherine Thorossian and Director of Counseling, College and Careers Dr. Catherine Real accepted the award on behalf of the District during the CSBA annual conference, held in San Diego on Dec. 5, 2019.

"Monrovia Unified's Early College Program is allowing first-generation students to receive a head start on their college education and create a culture of high expectations throughout the District," Thorossian said. "Thank you to the CSBA for recognizing the hard work of our ECP team and the innovative vision of our Board of Education."

The four-year program is designed to ease the financial burden of higher education and increase the number of underserved students who enroll in colleges and universities. The

ECP is offered at no cost, with college credits. courses taught by college instructors and Monrovia High School teachers at Monrovia

Monrovia Unified students can earn up to 54 units of transferable credits – about two years of college – providing a savings of as much as \$70,000 for tuition, books, housing and other costs for attending the University of California. Since the program's inception in 2017, more than 150 students have earned nearly 1,400

Of the students in Monrovia Unified's Early College Program, 41% qualify for free or reducedprice lunches, 35% are first-generation college candidates and more than 50% are Latino or African-American. The program's passing rate is 95%, surpassing Citrus College's rate by 25%.

"African American, Latino, and socioeconomically disadvantaged students underrepresented in higher education," Real said. "We want to

build upon our district culture of equity and access for every student, increase student engagement, and provide relief for our families as they face the task of financing the ever-increasing cost of a college education."

Students are recruited during their final year at middle school, with many starting the ECP the summer prior to freshman year with a Strategies for College Success course taught by a Monrovia Unified counselor. Other ECP courses include Basic Photography, History of Rock and Roll, Physical Oceanography, Art History and Public Address.

In 2016, the California State Legislature passed AB 288, which facilitated the establishment of College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) to expand dual-enrollment opportunities for underserved students.

The Golden Bell Award is one of California's leading educational honors, presented by the CSBA to promote excellence in public education and school board governance by recognizing

outstanding programs and governance practices.

"The Early College Program provides an array of opportunities for our college-bound students to experience the rigors of college classes and reduce the cost of a college education," Board President Rob Hammond said. "Monrovia Unified is committed to providing our community the support and resources required to ensure world-class education to world-class students."


