Glendora residents, parents, sisters and brothers, civic groups and merchants lined the parade route, waving and cheering the Christmas Parade participants. Glendora spirits were high, and the cheering was joyful as Glendora's Tartan marching band was heard down the street coming closer and marching proudly past the smiling bystanders. The Glendora High School pep squad and Flag twirlers in the familiar red plaid kilts were a sight to see. The Glendora High School Banner Line, twirling handheld individual shield letter boards, are seen first. The name in individual letters spelling GLENDORA comes marching in unison down the street. Flag twirlers come next and then the sound of bagpipes. The heart tugging sounds of the bagpipes playing our favorite songs makes everyone stare with proud smiles. Their colorful regalia, kilts and hats are a



sight and sound that doesn't get old. Following the bagpipers in perfectly pressed black, red and

white uniforms is the Glendora High School marching band. They are brilliant. And that is the beginning!

This year's parade had about 160 applicant entries and participants. Among the many participants was The boy scout Honor Guard, the Glendora PD SWAT vehicle, Daughters of the American revolution, important citizens

and civic leaders, the Celtic Fiddler, Bidwell's Biker Buddies, Guide Dogs of America, donkeys with the BB Ranch Foundation, Blue Rose Performing Arts, Charter Oak Marching Regiment, Dancers, Singers, Girl scouts, Glendora Historical Society, Glendora Rotary Club, Glendora National Little League, Citrus College and many churches and educational institutions and clubs. Jan's Towing always participates by donating their flatbed tow trucks and oversized U.S. Army tow vehicles.

And let's not forget, Santa and

Santa Claus at the Glendora Christmas Parade held at the Glendora Village on December 11, 2021. Mrs. Claus.

The Glendora Christmas Parade started in the early 1950's. It was more of a battle of the marching bands with paid judges and trophies. It got to be too expensive to continue to support. The Jaycees took on the Parade and kept in going in the 1960's to around 1998. The Jaycees disbanded around 1997 or 98 and the Christmas Parade was going to be part of Glendora history. Glendora Mayor, Sue Bauer, wanted the Christmas parade to continue and become part of Glendora's future. Sue Bauer got

together with Karen Babineau and the Christmas Parade Committee was kept intact and restructured itself to keep the Christmas parade alive. In 1999 the Rotary Club and the Kiwanis Club raised the money and provided the city with volunteers. Besides the service clubs, the city has volunteers from the police department, public works, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Glendora library Foundation Board. In 2020, Glendora didn't have its Christmas Parade due to the pandemic.

In the early years of the parade celebrities such as Woody Strode, Dallas Raines (channel 7 newsman), Frazier Smith (radio personality), and Tommy Lasorda rode as Grand Marshals. Glendora used to have a Miss Glendora contest and the winner would ride in the parade. Mike Rubel used to be Santa and he would toss frisbees, candy and little toys along the parade route. He would also have several of his old cars in the parade. Today, the Historical Society has taken over the care of the historic Rubel Castle and all the old cars. Several of the cars are still driven in the parade.

With each year's talents and the good wishes from Santa, Mrs. Claus and the donkeys, the Glendora Christmas Parade will go on into the future adding blessings to Glendora's charm.

"12 Days of Christmas" Price Index Reflects a Mostly-Reopened Economy

Following a bah-humbug year for the country's economy, one economic indicator predicts that the 2021 holiday season may resemble 2019 more than 2020 when it comes to price tags on

"With most events cancelled in 2020, we removed 'Ladies Dancing,' 'Drummers Drumming' and other live performances from the Index last year, which resulted in an unprecedented 59% drop from 2019," says Amanda Agati, chief investment officer for PNC Asset Management Group. "We're trying to normalize the comparison by excluding a once-in-a-century pandemic that had an outsized impact on last year's data."

Taking 2020 out of the equation, Agati notes that both inflation and consumer habits are driving the rising costs of goods and services. Indeed, a tech-savvy "True Love" will spend an additional \$4,394 by paying for the

Police also arrested a minor on Oct. 27 in connection with a Rimcrest Drive robbery that happened on Sept. 8 which was a violent felony. He has been released with pending juvenile court dates.


While the 20th century saw

City And Chamber Partner To Award More Than \$1,750,000 In Grants To Local Businesses And Non-Profit Organizations Impacted By The Coronavirus Pandemic

GLENDORA - On October 18, 2021 the City of Glendora, in partnership with the Glendora Chamber of Commerce, launched the Small Business and Non-Profit Rescue Grant Programs to help local businesses and organizations mitigate the financial hardships resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Funded by the American the pandemic." Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds received by the City, the Small Business and Non-Profit Rescue Grant Programs provided grants from \$5,000-\$25,000 to be used as working capital to cover the day-to-day business operating expenses such as rent/lease payments, mortgage payments, payroll and benefit costs, utility expenses, or expenses incurred to adopt safer operating procedures. Nonprofits could also utilize the grant for direct service provision to the community.

"Glendora's small businesses and non-profits are an important and vital part of our community," Mayor Davis said. "That is why the City Council unanimously voted to launch and fund these programs, to get the funds out as quickly as possible, and to provide much needed financial support to those impacted by the pandemic."

The City Council initially seeded the Small Business Rescue Grant Program with \$1,000,000, but given the need seen in our community increased its allocation up to \$1,620,000 to fully fund all eligible and complete applications submitted at the time of consideration. To date, 69 local businesses have been awarded a grant resulting in the City and Chamber awarding nearly \$1,600,000 in financial assistance to small businesses and nearly \$150,000 to six nonprofit organizations.

"The local small business community has been impacted time and again, navigating closures and restrictions on operations, as our community has endured the pandemic. This partnership with the City gives us the opportunity to lend a hand and is critical to help sus-

On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act to further promote recovery from the economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSFRF) and Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CLFRF), which provides a combined \$350 billion in assistance to eligible state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments to assist in the economic and health recovery by providing resources to address impacts resulting from the cri-

On October 12, 2021, the City Council approved a twoyear Expenditure Plan for all its American Rescue Plan Act funding, focusing on community-facing programs first, such as the Small Business and Non-Profit Rescue Grant Programs to help support our community. The City of Glendora will receive the funds in two installments.

Baldwin Park Police Department Holding DUI Checkpoint December 17th

BALDWIN PARK - Baldwin Park Police Department will hold a DUI Checkpoint December 17th from 7:00pm to 1:00am at an undisclosed location within Baldwin Park city limits.

Checkpoint locations are chosen based on a history of DUI crashes and arrests. The primary purpose of checkpoints is not to make arrests, but to promote public safety by deterring drivers from driving impaired. During the checkpoint, officers will look for signs that drivers are under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

The Baldwin Park Police De-

partment is committed to keeping the traveling public safe. "The safety of our community is and always will be our mission," Sergeant Andy Velebil said. "We are looking for impaired drivers because driving under the influence is dangerous and puts others on the road at risk."

Baldwin Park Police Department reminds the public that impaired driving is not just from alcohol. Some prescription medications or over-the-counter drugs may interfere with driving. Always follow directions for use and read warning labels about driving or "operating heavy ma-

chinery," which includes driving a car. While medicinal and recreational marijuana are legal, driving under the influence of marijuana is illegal.

If you plan on drinking or taking medications that may impact your ability to drive safely, plan on staying at home. Drivers charged with a first-time DUI face an average of \$13,500 in fines and penalties, as well as a suspended license.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Los Angeles County Reports Seventh Case of the Omicron Variant

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) has received confirmation of one additional case of COVID-19 with mutations consistent with the new Omicron variant (B.1.1.529). The individual recently traveled domestically, is fully vaccinated, had mild symptoms, and is self-isolating.

Public Health has identified close contacts in Los Angeles County, some of whom have tested negative, and others are awaiting test results. Additionally, close contacts have been identified outside of the County that are being tested.

"This latest case of the Omi-

cron variant in Los Angeles County underscores how critical safety measures are while traveling," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "All indications are that among those fully vaccinated, illness severity if infected with Omicron is mild, reminding us that all eligible residents need to urgently get vaccinated or boosted. The vaccines are likely to provide much needed protection against serious illness caused by Omicron and are already known to provide protection against infection and disease associated with the Delta variant that continues to dominate across the County."

Additionally, all residents across LA County should continue:

• Getting tested to help reduce the spread, especially if you traveled for the holidays, have had a possible exposure or have symptoms

• Adhering to masking requirements when indoors or at large outdoor mega events, regardless of vaccination status

Residents are also reminded that they are legally required to be isolated if they have a positive COVID test result and that vaccinated close contacts with symptoms and unvaccinated close contacts need to be quarantined.

With Booster Eligibility Expanding to 16-17 Year Olds, Los Angeles County Highlights Low Infection Rate of Booster Recipients LOS ANGELES COUNTY – for the winter and the potential tive infection rate of 165 case

LOSANGELES COUNTY – COVID-19 vaccine providers in Los Angeles County are now administering Pfizer booster doses to children 16 and 17 years old after the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Rochelle P. Walensky affirmed the recommendation by the U.S. Food & Drug Administration to expand the booster eligibility.

Public Health continues to track the emergence of the Omicron variant and is taking steps to address the potential threats that may be posed by the variant, with a focus on protecting those who live in areas where there are higher numbers of cases, hospitalizations, and death rates.

Since vaccine effectiveness wanes over time, Public Health is encouraging residents to get boosted as soon as they are eligible, especially as we prepare circulation of Omicron.

According to early data from

around the world, people who have received booster doses have better protection from Omicron infection than those who have received only a primary vaccine series. Additionally, we have seen strong evidence from L.A. County showing boosters are an effective way to protect yourself: Between November 23rd and 29th, people who had received both a primary vaccine series and a booster had six-fold more protection from infection than did people who had received the primary vaccine series alone (seven-day cumulative rates: 7 cases/100,000 vs. 43 cases/ 100,000). Unsurprisingly, unvaccinated people were at the highest risk over the same period of time, with a seven-day cumulative infection rate of 165 cases/100,000.

During times of high Covid transmission, differences in outcomes between more and less vulnerable groups have historically widened, with vulnerable populations experiencing more severe outcomes as transmission rises. In response, the Community Health Workers Initiative aims to narrow these gaps by reaching out to residents and business in high-need communities to provide them with critical information about COVID-19 vaccinations. Community health workers also provide residents with culturally relevant education on steps they can take to slow the spread of the virus, which include getting vaccinated or boosted, getting tested, and adhering to masking requirements.

Burglary Suspect Shot by Homeowner



AZUSA - Detectives from both the Los Angeles County Sheriff's office and the Azusa police department are investigating a shooting that occurred at a home in the 200 block of North Barbara Avenue December 8th around 4:45 p.m.

Apparently, the unidentified person who was shot was attempting to burglarize the home when things went all wrong. The unidentified homeowner, who was in fear of their life, took matters into their own hands and defended themself from the burglary suspect and shot him. The suspect was shot in the neck and was critically injured.

Police responded to a call of the shooting and found the injured suspect and had the paramedics respond. The homeowner who shot the suspect was not identified or arrested and is cooperating with investigators.

The street was blocked off just in case there were other suspects in the area and once the area was cleared the paramedics were allowed in to treat and transport the suspect to Pomona Valley Hospital Medical Center. The present condition of the suspect is not known at this time. He was charged with the crimes.



Juvenile Justice System Shifted To Locals

I got emails asking about the new jail being proposed for the hills above La Verne and Marshal Canyon Golf Course. It is not a new jail. It is existing juvenile offender camps being reassessed after Gov. Newsom signed SB 823 last year transferring the responsibility for juvenile justice to county governments. Camp Afflerbaugh-Paige is above La Verne, Camp Glen Rock above San Dimas. These camps are not jails but "lockdown" facilities for juvenile offenders, some with alcohol and drug problems, and schools overseen by Los Angeles County Office of Education

(LACOE). U.S. News offers the following: At Afflerbaugh-Paige Camp, the total minority enrollment is 98%, and 94% of students are economically disadvantaged. Afflerbaugh-Paige Camp is 1 of 15 high schools under Los Angeles County Office of Education. COVID mandates may restrict enrollment.

SB 823 was a 2020 budget trailer bill closing the Department of Youth and Community Restoration and Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) on July 1, 2021, and establishing the Office of Youth and Community Restoration (OYCR) in the Health and Human Services Agency. The directive in SB 823 for this new department: "Promote trauma responsive, culturally informed services for youth involved in the juvenile justice system that support the youths' successful transition into adulthood and help them become responsible, thriving, and engaged members of their communities."

To accomplish SB 823's mission, all 58 counties established a Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council, with a Juvenile Justice Realignment Block Grant (JJR-BG) Subcommittee charged to develop plans to house youth lawbreakers. The Juvenile Justice Realignment Block Grant (JJR-BG) subcommittee, is chaired by County Probation Department, with representatives from the

District Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office, Department of Social Services, Department of Mental Health, LA County Office of Education (LA-COE), the Court, and a minimum of three community members. That plan they were to develop should include, but was not limited to, a description of the facilities, programs, services and supervision appropriate to both rehabilitate and supervise the DJJ

In July this year, L.A. County 5th District Supervisor, Kathryn Barger, discovered this committee was ready to designate locations without any meaningful analysis and community input after San Clarita City Attorney "... issued a letter to the County raising concerns and questions around the County's due diligence in selecting these sites, specifically, alleging the County's failure to comply with California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)." L.A. County findings were no CEQA violations but no adequate plan allowing for community discussions and input.

Supervisor Barger, backed by 1st District Supervisor Hilda Solis, submitted a motion outlining their concerns including the ability of the County to reach out to communities for their input, noting May 2021, SB 92 was enacted which declared June 30, 2023, as the actual closure date of DJJ and the need for LA County designated facilities to be

Supervisors' Barger and Solis motion, dated July 27, 2021, with a directive to report back to them in 60 days included:

· Campus Kilpatrick, Malibu, as a primary L.A. County Probation designated temporary Secure Youth Treatment Facility (SYTF) for up to 45 male youth until they can find a permanent

The Assange Case Threatens **Fundamental Rights**

Former President Trump rightfully received criticism when he pardoned war criminals for their atrocities in Afghanistan and Iraq. Nevertheless, the media has remained largely silent as the U.S. continues to pursue its prosecution of WikiLeaks founder and journalist Julian Assange for exposing war crimes. The media ignores his case at their own peril, however, as it may have alarming implications for press freedoms worldwide. It also raises deeper concerns about the credibility of the U.S. as a proponent of human rights.

As the world marked International Human Rights Day on December 10, a ruling by the UK High Court in London paved the way for Assange's extradition to the U.S., where he faces trial for allegations of espionage and publishing secret documents that carry a combined sentence of up to 175 years in prison. This ruling overturned a previous lower court decision that had blocked his extradition on the grounds that he would be a suicide risk due to his physical and mental health issues as well as the inhumane conditions in U.S. prisons. The High Court stated that it was "satisfied" with the U.S. government's diplomatic assurances regarding Assange's potential treatment in prison. In reality, these assurances remain dubious given that the U.S. has reserved the right to change its mind at any

Assange intends to appeal the court's decision. In the meantime, he remains imprisoned and under prolonged isolation at the high-security Belmarsh prison in London, where he has been since 2019 following his expulsion from the Ecuador Embassy. Although not convicted of any crimes, he has already endured severe restrictions on his life and ability to prepare his legal defense. By contrast, the late-Chilean dictator Augusto Pinochet was merely placed under house arrest in his London mansion and ultimately released while he awaited potential extradition to Spain in 1998 for his appalling human rights abuses and geno-



cide charges. Former Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher even paid him a visit.

A citizen of Australia, Assange faces charges under the U.S. Espionage Act for allegedly assisting a whistleblower in the release of documents that uncovered illegal state conduct and corruption. Although this law dates back to 1917, the Justice Department has in more recent times increasingly weaponized its use against media sources, including WikiLeaks, who share "classified" documents or relay sensitive information to journalists.

Between 2010 to 2011, WikiLeaks published thousands of classified State Department documents leaked by U.S. Army intelligence analyst Chelsea Manning, who was prosecuted, imprisoned, and later pardoned by President Obama. Among the noteworthy revelations included evidence of war crimes in Iraq. In "Collateral Murder" published in April 2010, shocking video footage showed indiscriminate attacks in 2007 by two U.S. helicopter gunships killing civilians and two Reuters journalists in

Baghdad. The Assange case matters because it implicates the fundamental freedom of information and press, enshrined under binding international human rights treaties and the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. As the socalled "fourth estate," journalism is supposed to educate and inform the public and serve as a necessary check on the abuse of power by governments, corporations, and individuals alike. Poly Pomona.

Criminalizing journalists and media sources like Assange over the journalistic practice of publishing classified documents obtained from a source (remember Watergate?) will have a chilling effect on future investigative re-

The U.S. and U.K. collusion in Assange's pending extradition also raises larger concerns about the West's credibility when it comes to human rights and the democratic rule of law. Autocratic states are undoubtedly watching. A culture of impunity arises when human rights abusers, particularly in the highest positions of power, are not punished for their crimes. This weakens the greater observance and advancement of human rights and the rule of law by states across the globe, rather than solidify their integral place in society.

Nils Melzer, the UN Special Rapporteur on Torture, concluded that the WikiLeaks releases, like the video of the U.S. attack on Iraqi civilians, "contained clear evidence for corruption and war crimes and other criminal conduct." Yet while Assange is criminalized over their publication, Iragis over a decade later still await accountability from both the U.S. and U.K. governments over their respective conduct during the course of the illegal war.

Ironically, the High Court rendered its verdict against Assange as President Biden's Summit on Democracy commenced. Before the summit, U.S. Secretary of State Anthony Blinken touted the "indispensable role" of the press, yet the government's continued persecution of Assange clearly contradicts this message.

Rather than jeopardize fundamental rights, President Biden should listen to Reporters Without Borders' call to release Assange and "lead by example" by closing this case now "before it does any more damage."

Is Critical Race Theory Being Taught In California?

Total U.S. retirement assets approximate \$37.2 trillion as of June 30, 2021. Retirement assets accounted for 33% of all household financial assets in the United States at the end of June 2021. Of this amount, roughly \$7.5 trillion was held in federal, state, and local government retirement plans - the rest (about \$30 trillion) is held in private accounts. Coincidentally \$30 trillion is about what it would take to pay off the current federal debt.

Comrade Omarova also thinks that asset prices, pay scales, access to capital, and credit should be overseen by federal agencies - by an unaccountable bureaucracy run by an academic intelligentsia. Her idea of establishing a National Investment Authority to be overseen by an advisory board of academics fortunately was rejected by the Senate in the current infrastructure bill that Biden signed recently.

efficient. We decided to buy a newly constructed home. The builder's salesperson emphatically said that we have to get our financing from his lending company, or they won't sell to us. She also said that it's the only way to get the discounts and perks that we can apply to the closing costs or to upgrades. Is this true?

The bottom line is that builders can entice, wheedle, and woo buyers with great deals, but it is illegal for them to threaten you. If a buyer does feel threatened, they should first stand their ground, then complain to the builder and to the state and federal consumer affairs officials. Most builders will say they are just giving you the choice of using their lender. Read the fine print in your contract. (It could be worthwhile to have a real estate attorney look at the contract, too.) You might discover that you could use that builder's lender, get all the discounts and perks, and then refinance.

Is it too late to get a lower rate without a lot of origination, etc., fees? I'm currently paying almost 6-percent interest rate on my old 30-year mortgage, which seems high. The loan started at \$350,000, I currently owe \$110,000, and my monthly payment (not counting property taxes and insurance) is \$2,000. I'm on a fixed income.

Providing you qualify (income, credit scores, other debt), and based on your current rate and payment amount, you could considerably lower your monthly mortgage payment. Don't procrastinate, as interest rates are not expected to stay this low for much longer. Keep in mind that an independent mortgage broker (Findamortgagebroker.com) has access to a much larger selection of loans and rates than any bank or credit union. There are refinance loans available now that match the number of years you have left in your current loan. However, a 30-year mortgage could dramatically lower your current payment. Refinancing does cost and it takes time to recover those costs.

"TIME JOCKEY" - Eyewitness Account

Battle of the Rio San Gab*riel...* Many historical events are recorded based on the descriptions and recollections of an observer, an impartial and independent person who based on his or her own interpretations record their understanding of an event or action. Battles during a war conflict usually have multiple persons who saw a similar set of actions and tend to recall what happened according to their own view of how, when, what, why and where events and an action hap-

On January 8, 1847, in one of the last battles of the Mexican-American War, the Battle of the Rio San Gabriel, three U.S. servicemen were killed. The battle was a short-lived skirmish between the Californio forces and the combined U.S Army and U.S. Navy forces, and even though a minimal number of deaths and casualties occurred as a result of the battle, the fact is that lives were lost which is usually what happens during any type of con-

In the case of the Battle of the Rio San Gabriel, the three servicemen killed were Ordinary Seaman Frederic Strauss, Ordinary Seaman Thomas Smith, and Jacob Hait, a volunteer artillery driver. Overall, on the U.S. side there was one death on the day of the battle and 9 casualties of which 2 would eventually die from their wounds. Ordinary Seaman Frederic Strauss was the only fatality killed on January 8th, the day of the battle. Seaman Strauss was assigned to the U.S.S. Portsmouth which had arrived at San Diego Bay in December 1846 and was still in the bay on December 29, 1846 as Commodore Stockton and General Kearny started their march on the Pueblo de Los Angeles.

In the meantime, Seaman Strauss had been transferred to the U.S.S. Cyane, a 790-ton sloop of war with 20 guns under the command of Commodore Stockton. The U.S.S Cyane was docked at San Pedro but when General Kearny arrived in South-



ern California, Commodore Stockton enlarged his command with members from the crew of the U.S.S Cyane, one of which was Seaman Strauss. Assigned to one of Commodore Stockton's company's, Seaman Strauss was assigned to load one of the cannons included with the arms of the US forces. When the Battle of Rio San Gabriel started, the Californios initiated fire and drove the American forces to the opposite side of the river. From there, the American forces setup their line of cannons and started firing to keep the Californio forces at bay. According to an eyewitness account, Seaman Strauss was the first person hit by enemy fire. Strauss was the

Fire and Match Man to the Gun which had just been sighted by Commodore Stockton and was just about ready to light the fuse when an enemy cannon ball ripped through Strauss' shoulder and neck area killing his instantly. The account recorded that Strauss' body was moved to one of the wagons and then buried that night at the foot of the hill where he had died. Straus was eulogized as a kind-heartened "chap" and a good shipmate and was positively eulogized by those who wished to speak about him.

The Battle of the Rio San Gabriel is documented in the history books as one of the last battles between Mexican and American forces but for those who fought in the battle, it is the recording and memory of the what, where, who, why and how an event or action took place and it is that reason how we know the way Ordinary Seaman Frederic Strauss became a fatality in the Battle of the Rio San Gabriel...




