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### Newsom Signs Housing and Homelessness Funding Package as Part of \$100 Billion California Comeback Plan

\$12 billion investment over two years to tackle homelessness, the largest in state history, focuses on behavioral health housing and solutions to tent encampments

SEBASTOPOL - At a Homekey site in Sebastopol, Governor Gavin Newsom signed the largest funding and reform package for housing and homelessness in California history as part of the \$100 billion California Comeback Plan. The package includes \$10.3 billion for affordable housing and \$12 billion over two years towards tackling the homelessness crisis head-on - helping tens of thousands of people off the streets while also demanding greater accountability and more urgency from local governments.

The new homelessness funding includes \$5.8 billion to add 42,000 new housing units through Homekey – a national model for homeless housing. \$3 billion of this investment is dedicated to housing for people with the most acute behavioral and physical health needs. Governor Newsom's investment is the biggest expansion in decades in terms of clinically enhanced behavioral health housing in Cali-

"I don't think homelessness can be solved - I know homelessness can be solved," said Governor Newsom. "We are

going all-in with innovative solutions that we know work – with a focus on creating housing to support people with severe mental health challenges, and with more money than ever to move people out of encampments and into safer situations. With record investments tied to strong accountability and efficiency mea-

sures, California will continue to build on the groundbreaking success of Homekey, changing the lives of tens of thousands of Californians for the better and supporting communities across the state."

AB 140, also includes \$2 billion in aid to counties, large cities and Continuums of Care through the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention grant program (HHAP). To qualify, recipients must follow strict accountability measures and submit a local homelessness action plan that includes quantifiable, data-driven goals that jurisdictions must commit to meeting.

In addition to these investments addressing homelessness and housing affordability, the California Comeback Plan includes \$1.1 billion to clean up the streets of California by partnering with local governments to pick up trash and beautify downtowns, freeways and neighborhoods across California. The program is expected to generate up to 11,000 jobs over three years.

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) is reporting a significant increase in the number of people hospitalized each day for COVID-19 illness. There are 528 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized; last Monday, masking. Public Health is working there were 372 people hospitalized and on June 15, there were

Masking for everyone while indoors, regardless of vaccination status, went in to effect on Saturday at 11:59 p.m. in all indoor public places, venues, gatherings, and businesses (including offices, retail, restaurants, gyms, theaters, family entertainment centers, meetings, and state and local government offices serving the public). Standard exceptions apply for children under the age of two, for those with certain medical conditions or disabilities that prevent masking, and for those whose job doesn't permit

closely with worksites and businesses so that they have the tools needed to ensure that their employees and customers are adhering to the indoor masking requirement. Public Health inspectors continue to visit sites regularly to address questions and concern, ensure compliance with Cal/OSHA standards and the Health Officer Order, and also respond to complaints of noncompliance. Public Health utilizes education and information sharing as the primary step in gaining compliance. When compliance is not achieved at worksites and businesses, enforcement may include issuance of a notice of violation or a citation.

Violations of safety requirements and dangerous conditions can be reported anonymously to Public Health by phone at 888-700-9995 or online at www.publichealth.lacounty.gov.

Public Health has confirmed 1,233 new cases of COVID-19. Of the two new deaths reported Monday, one person that passed away was over the age of 80 and one person who passed was between the ages of 65 and 79. The number of cases and deaths like-

ly reflect reporting delays over the weekend. To date, Public Health identified 1,269,090 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,585 deaths. Testing results are available for more than 7,182,000 individuals with 16% of people testing positive.

"To everyone who have lost someone to COVID-19, our hearts and our deepest condolences go out to you," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "L.A. County continues to see alarming trends of increased community spread. The spread of the more infectious Delta variant through intermingling of unmasked individuals where vaccination status is unknown has caused a rapid spread of COVID-19 that is resulting in a significant increase in cases and hospitalizations. By wearing masks indoors at public places and worksites, we can get back to slowing the spread of the virus. Many businesses and worksites are doing their part by posting signs and asking employees and customers to mask up while indoors. Please do you part and cooperate. If you are not yet vaccinated, please know that we need you to take extra precautions. Since vaccines remain the most powerful tool for reducing spread, now is the time to get your vaccine. We need to bring down transmission rates so that when schools open next month, there is much less risk."

# **HP Cadet Class Graduates . . . Finally!**

**SACRAMENTO** – The longawaited graduation of California Highway Patrol (CHP) Cadet Training Class I-20 took place on Friday, July 16 at the CHP Academy. The CHP's 119 newest officers (18 women and 101 men) received their badges following a swearing-in ceremony 75 weeks after their training began.

Traditionally, cadet training at the CHP Academy takes place over 29 weeks. However, a little more than a month after arriving at the academy on February 10, 2020, safety precautions necessitated by the COVID-19 pandemic led to the closure of the live-in training facility in West Sacramento. While away from the academy, cadets were assigned to CHP Area offices throughout the state to observe a wide variety of activities and tasks uniformed officers routinely perform, enhancing the knowledge they had gained in the classroom. Cadets also participated in online learning for the first time.

"To say these cadets have been well-trained would be an understatement," CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray said. "Today's graduates persevered through

# **Delta Variant and Unmasked Intermingling Cause COVID-19 Cases to Increase** Four-Fold Since 4th of July

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - COVID-19 currently hospital-Nearly two weeks after the Fourth of July holiday and one month after the June 15 reopening, transmission of COVID-19 in L.A. County has rapidly increased to very concerning levels. This is due to the presence of the more infectious Delta variant and the intermingling of unmasked individuals where vaccination status is unknown.

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) confirmed 1,827 new cases of COVID-19; a four-fold increase from the 457 cases seen on July 4 and an eight-fold increase from the 210 cases seen on June 15.

July 17's daily test positivity rate is 3.7%. On July 4, test positivity was near 1.5% and June 15, test positivity was near 0.5%.

County who have not been or are not eligible to be vaccinated, including 1.3 million children under 12 years of age, the Los Angeles County Health Officer Order was modified to require masking for everyone while indoors, regardless of vaccination status to prevent increased COV-

ID-19 spread. Effective Saturday, July 17, 2021 at 11:59 PM, masks will be required in all indoor public places, venues, gatherings, and businesses (including offices, retail, restaurants, theaters, family entertainment centers, meetings, and state and local government offices serving the public). Some exceptions will apply, similar to the exceptions in masking requirements that were in place prior to the June 15 reopening. This includes exceptions for children under the age of two, for those with certain medical conditions or disabilities that prevent masking, and for those whose job doesn't permit masking. To date, Public Health identified 1,266,227 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,579 deaths. Of the eleven new deaths reported today, two people that passed away were over the age of 80, two people who passed were between the ages of 65 and 79, five people who passed were between the ages of 50 and 64, one person who passed was between the ages of 30 and 49, and one person who passed was between the ages of 18 and 29. Testing results are available for nearly 7,170,000 individuals with 16%

"To everyone grieving the loss of a loved one, we send you our deepest condolences and wish you healing," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "Thankfully, we have over 5 million fully vaccinated residents who are well protected from severe illness and death due to COVID-19. Given the increased intermingling among unmasked people where vaccination status is unknown, the millions of people still unvaccinated, and the increased circulation of the highly transmissible Delta variant, we are seeing a rapid increase in COVID-19 infection. The level of COVID-19 transmission we are currently experiencing is now leading to significant increases in serious illness and hospitalizations, and requires us to take immediate action to prevent erosion of our recovery efforts. And while vaccinations are by far the most powerful tool we have, we are nowhere near herd immunity. While we continue efforts to increase vaccination coverage and build confidence in the vaccines, the simplest and most effective public health measure to add back is to require that everyone wear a mask in all indoor public places and businesses. For those of us already vaccinated, we have been required for the last couple of months to continue to wear masks in many other public places including on all public transit, at all healthcare settings, schools and day care facilities. This was done in recognition that the vaccines, while extraordinarily effective, are not perfect and that we continue to have an obligation to reduce risk as much as possible. Please help us get back to slowing the spread by wearing your mask indoors. And for those eligible and not yet vaccinated, please consider getting vaccinated as soon as possible as our full recovery is in jeopardy until more



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### **Supervisors to Reconsider Current** Ban on Commercial Cannabis in **Unincorporated LA County**

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors voted to support a proposal by Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn to reconsider the current ban on commercial cannabis production and distribution in unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County.

"It has been three long years since we decided to keep the cannabis ban in place in the unincorporated area and a lot has changed," said Supervisor Janice Hahn, who authored the motion today. "We've seen how legalization has played out in cities in our own county and we have seen states across the country move in the direction of legalizing, taxing, and regulating cannabis. It

may be time for us to join them." "With more local jurisdictions moving towards the legalization of recreational and commercial cannabis. LA County can use this moment to evaluate best practices and develop a framework for cannabis regulation and enforcement in unincorporated areas of the County," shared Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors Chair, Hilda L. Solis, Supervisor to the First District, who coau-

"The County can leverage pre-existing recommendations like the report provided by the Office of Cannabis Management in 2017 and look to other regions that have instituted cannabis regulations to drive an equitable plan that will provide a framework for the distribution, retail, manufacturing, enforcement, and regulation of cannabis."

> Shortly after the passage of Proposition 64, the "Adult Use of Marijuana Act," the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors enacted a ban on the commercial production and distribution of cannabis in unincorporated areas of the county. The ban was intended to be temporary until the County could develop and establish proper regulations. The Board established the Office of Cannabis Management which convened a Working Group on Cannabis Regulation to develop recommendations for the Board to consider. After conducting extensive community outreach and eight public convenings, the Working Group presented a report to the Board of Supervisors with 64 recommendations.

However, in June 2018, the Board of Supervisors chose to accept the report but not take any action to remove the cannabis ban. At the time, Supervisor Hahn said the intention was not to rush the issue and felt there were too many unanswered questions and uncertainties.

In the three years since then, much has changed and evolved in the area of cannabis legalization. Multiple additional states have legalized recreational cannabis and the county's two largest cities, Los Angeles and Long Beach, are now allowing commercial

The Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to support a motion authored by Supervisor Hahn and coauthored by Supervisor Hilda Solis that directs the Office of Cannabis Management and other relevant county departments to revisit the regulation recommendations report and report back to the board with updated recommendations for cannabis retail, manufacturing, distribution, growth, testing, regulation, and enforcement in Los Angeles County in 120 days.

## **Barger's Motion To Enhance Enforcement Of Water Theft And** Illegal Cannabis Grows Approved By Board Of Supervisors

LOSANGELES COUNTY-During the Board of Supervisors meeting, the Board of Supervisors approved a motion by Supervisor Kathryn Barger and co-authored by Supervisor Shelia Kuehl to curb the significant negative impacts of illegal large-scale cannabis grows which includes water theft, trespass, use of dangerous pesticides and chemicals, and littered debris.

"While the national and local media reports on this issue, have focused on the Antelope Valley and surrounding desert communities, illegal marijuana grows will impact the entire County of Los Angeles," said Supervisor Kathryn Barger. "As the State enters another potential drought emergency, we need to ensure that this new activity does not further exacerbate water scarcity. In addition, I am very concerned that illegal growers are using unregulated chemicals to process marijuana and selling these products to both legal and illegal dispensaries throughout the LA basin endangering cannabis users, contributing to contamination and pollution, and threatening water quality and safety."

The motion asks the Chief Executive Office (Legislative Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations Branch) to coordinate with relevant County departments to support or pursue legislation at the State level that will: provide standing to County Counsel to civilly prosecute and enjoin water theft; provide additional enforcement authority for water theft and/or misuse in declared drought emergencies; authorize County Counsel to civilly prosecute and enjoin water pollution from cannabis cultivation; address potential loopholes or exploitation by illegal cannabis growers and pursue increasing local government controls over illegal cannabis and unregistered hemp crops; and authorize an alternative means of service of process for commercial cannabis businesses when their business entity status is form unknown.

The motion also asked County Counsel to work with relevant departments and agencies to report back to the Board in 90 days with a proposed administrative nuisance abatement ordinance for unpermitted cannabis activity including illegal cannabis cultivation and dispensaries; and, asked

Regional Planning to study a future ordinance to regulate hemp and report back to the board in 180 days with recommendations.

"The whack-a-mole problem of illegal cannabis dispensaries and now illegal cannabis grows popping up throughout the County has been exacerbated by the lack of a regulating ordinance," said Supervisor Barger.

As part of this effort, Supervisor Barger allocated \$250,000 to finance the Sheriff's Department's continued targeted enforcement and patrols of the areas impacted by the massive illegal grows and water theft in the Antelope Valley and has asked the CEO to report back on potential funding sources for the County to sustain eradication of this serious environmental and quality of life nuisance.

"Finally, when examining the true impact of illegal grows outside of environmental impacts, public safety and consumer health, we cannot overlook the fact that the cartels and growers are engaging in human trafficking and coercion to provide the manual labor in the fields," Supervisor Barger continued.

### Glendora's Letter Goes to Gascon

As of July 13, 2021, 22 of the 88 cities in Los Angeles County served by the L.A. County District Attorney's Office have issued "no confidence" resolutions and Monrovia and West Covina wrote letters to express their concerns with L.A. County District Attorney George Gascon and his special directives. Glendora City Council met on July 13th to discuss their concerns regarding Gascon and, on a 5-0 vote, followed up that discussion with a letter mailed off to him on July 14th.

George Gascon was elected L.A. County D.A. November 3rd with 54% of the County wide vote, but in the report from Glendora City Manager, Adam Raymond, Glendora voters supported Jackie Lacey 62.18% over 37.8% for Gas-

Glendora Council, after a lengthy late-night discussion, came up with a long-term solution beginning with a letter to Gascon, signed by Democrat Mayor Karen Davis, conferring to Gascon the same message other cities have shared adding, "... Your office has the extraordinary responsibility to execute the laws enacted by voters and the Legislature, to help prevent and to prosecute crime, and protect the general public against the criminals that exist in our community." Charges from those who have suffered at the hands of criminals indicate distress over the overwhelming support Gascon has shown criminals rather than support for the victims of crimes including murder.

The Glendora letter communicated, "One of the major concerns of our community is that criminals may now believe they can commit certain crimes with impunity with the implementation of your [Gascon] special directives." There are ten of those special directives but the three causing most con-

- Elimination of cash bail for any misdemeanor, non-serious and non-violent felonies after voters approved retention of the cash bail system;
- Declining to prosecute and dismissing several misdemeanors under Special Directive 20-07 - trespassing disturbing the peace, criminal threats, drug and paraphernalia possession, under the influence of controlled substances, public intoxication and resisting arrest
- Elimination of several enhancements including the Three Strikes Law, gang enhancements including use of a gun in the commission of a crime and violations of bail.

Staff report indicates as of June 20th, 161 cases were rejected by the district attorney's office and 84% were narcotics cases or related to narcotics. Other cases involved the homeless population under Special Directive 20.07.

Glendora has been criticized for not passing a "no confidence" resolution on Gascon, but Mayor Pro Tem Gary Boyer said, "We are running a marathon and not a sprint ... and we have until October 27th to secure 579,000 signatures, and December 8th to certify those signatures so the recall can be put on the ballot. The election would be held 60 to 80 days after certification which would be February or early March. Any action we take in July is not going to be remembered at

Two things to consider as actions by all city councils evolve, and first, is the pending court action by the Association of Deputy District Attorneys for Los Angeles County versus George Gascon, et al. The ADDA received back a 46-page decision ruling portions of the Special Directive 20-08 preventing district attorneys pleading or proving prior "strikes" is unlawful. The court, as I read it, ruled against Gascon's special directives on eliminating enhancements and choices to prosecute or not and to dismiss cases was again unlawful based on existing statutes. Gascon has appealed those rulings.

Measure J, created by L.A. County Supervisors Sheila Kuehl and Hilda Solis, opposed by Kathryn Barger, and approved by the voters on November 3rd is action creating a mandatory 10% of L.A. County's locally generated unrestricted funds to be appropriated to support the Alternatives to Incarceration Programs in lieu of criminal prosecution. Coalition of County Unions versus County Supervisors went to court and the Superior Court judge blocked Measure J from taking effect. The question --Is it legal for a voter-approved initiative to strip elected officials of their fundamental roles of making law/deciding on a budget.

Boyer, with concurrence of Council, suggested a combination of options from letter-writing to a "no confidence" resolution will keep the issues on the table and evident to Gascon. "We will still need to be able to work with the D.A. ... but we need to keep pressure on the D.A. to let him know we are not comfortable with a lot of decisions that are being made."

Between court cases and the recall effort, with continual letter-writing, these issues may be resolved quickly and permanently.

# Non-Stop Gun Violence in the **US Drags Public into Abyss**

According to CBS news, at least 82 people have been shot during the Independent Day weekend in Chicago, among them 14 were fatally. Ironically, merely hours before the shootings started on Friday, a six-hour long special Chicago City Council hearing was held to address the city's crime problems with Chicago Police Supt. David Brown.

July 4th holiday weekend violence has a notorious history in Chicago area. Last year during the same time, nearly 80 people were shot, 15 fatally. In 2019, at least 68 people were shot and 5 killed over the Independence Day weekend.

Even before the holiday weekend, shootings in Chicago this year are up 15% over last year, according to police department statistics released in June. Concerns over the gun violence has risen to a new height. Chicago based civil right activist Rev Jesse Jackson stated: "We urge people to put down their guns, stop the violence. Of course, when they

see violence - [an] attempt to overthrow our government and they're treated with kid gloves, it decreases the message: If you pick up a gun and shoot somebody, you're not walking away," Jackson said. "We deserve a better America."

Chicago is not alone in the surge of summer gun crime across the whole country. In the month of June, there were two gun shooting crimes took place in the tourist-jammed Time Square, injured at least 4 people including a 4-year-old girl and a tourist.

"We've had another shooting in Times Square, which is absolutely unacceptable and we will not tolerate," New York City Mayor Bill De Blasio said during a briefing session after the second shooting in Time Square. Shooting incidents in New York City are up 42.7% in the first half of the year compared to 2020, according to NYPD crime statistics.

However, the debates and condemns after each gun violent illustrate only the vicious cycle of the gun violence in the country. Every case typically sparks a short-lived and fruitless debate about the need for stricter gun control. Everyone knows of it and so many people hate it, but it has existed and will last at least in the foreseeable future. Attitude and resolution expression by politicians is just another repetition as a show to let the voters know "I care." However not a real solution to stop it from the root has ever been proposed, let alone implementation.

There have been more than 300 mass shootings across the US in 2021 so far, according to the Gun Violence Archive. Each mass shooting has at least four people shot, not including the shooter. The same database counted more than 600 such shootings in 2020, compared with 417 in 2019.

Under one of President Joe Biden's Twitter post condemning mass shooting, thousands of people replied, and comments said "I think the President should keep the US flag over the White House at halfstaff continuously until Congress passes both House gun purchase background check bills, then raise it back to full staff the day he signs both bills. Sends a very visible message." Another commented, "Today while this tragedy occurred, the GOP eliminated some existing gun control laws. They don't care about the people who've died. They've made money deals with the gun lobbyists to block sensible gun control against the prevailing will of the people. We must change this."

Well, half-staff is far from being a visible message, there is too much to do if the Biden administration really wants to overwhelm the gun control policy in the US; for vested economic interests, the GOP won't give in. They have the bigger say on the issue.

Then, let's ask a question "is there any possibility for the US to have a feasible gun control policy?"

Legally speaking, nowhere in the world is gun control more controversial than in the United States, where gun possession is constitutionally protected but where murders committed with guns are extremely common. Since it's protected by the constitution, the majority of the US society have been used to it in the past more than 200 years. It is not hard to imagine the difficulties of challenging an item in the constitution, although the social context and background nowadays differed so much from 200

Politically speaking, politicians of both major parties, fearful of retaliation from the National Rifle Association (NRA) - the No.1 sponsor of the presidential election, solemnly offer their "thoughts and prayers" while refusing to enact reasonable and constitutional measures now favored by a majority of Americans, such as expanded background checks for gun purchases and the reinstatement of a federal ban on assault weapons, which Congress allowed to lapse in 2004, the britannica.com pointed out.

tle done" gun control slogan repetition by politicians of both parties in the US is well understood, which is also the case with the US main media outlets. They are also reporting, on many occasions, emotionally enough, to dig out stories beneath stories of the mass shooting victims and their families. But all the news is shortlived. Day by day, nothing changed and only the families are suffering from the pain.

Thus the "much said but lit-

"maybe because there are not enough deaths." To realize the process of quantitative change to qualitative change in the gun control policy, should there be more shootings and more deaths? If the answer is yes, then how many is the criterion? Just as Biden said in his twitter "Every life taken by a bullet pierces the soul of our nation," how many more pierces are waiting for the US soul? Not only the elite groups and

grassroots general public in the US should reflect and meditate their governance and political system, but also the global thinkers and observers should advise on possibilities before more tragedies occur.

Right now, the only way for people in the US to fall victim to the shooting crimes seems to be praying to the God to bless them good luck every day.

# We Need To Know The Cause Of Death

In this age of supposed scientific medicine and a pandemic, we are relying on death certificates for statistics on the cause of death, even though they are known to be extremely unreli-

Thousands of healthy people are dying unexpectedly, but our public health agencies are assuring us that their death was not caused by the COVID jab. The toll of post-vaccine deaths has reached nearly 7,000, according to the Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System (VAERS). It's the best system we've got, even though it misses 90 percent or more of the actual events.

But I have seen a report of just one autopsy. This patient had had one dose of the Pfizer shot and died four weeks later. Although there were no characteristic features of COVID-19, almost all tissues tested positive on PCR for SARS-CoV-2.

A 45-year-old mother just died of heart issues and brain swelling, shortly after getting the COVID shot required before she could begin her job at Johns Hopkins University. There will be tears and flowers, but probably no autopsy-and no pause in the shots demanded for mothers and potential mothers if they want to work at JHU.

My internal medicine training was in the dark ages before CT and MRI, but we were still supposed to make an accurate diagnosis. A patient who died without a medical history was an "ME case." We had to call the medical examiner, who would decide whether an autopsy was indicated. Anything potentially related to the death, such as pill bottles, was evidence. If an injection had

been given, the vial would be recovered if possible. With vaccines, one is supposed to record the lot number, so it would be possible to check a sample for contaminants.

a February election."

If the patient died in hospital, the medical resident was required to request permission for an autopsy. Survivors might be persuaded by the possibility that their loved one may have had a hereditary condition or an infection that might affect them. In any event, we assured them that their loved one would be treated with respect and that funeral arrangements would not be affected. A chaplain would volunteer to at-

The most important reason was that the "altar of truth" was the ultimate "quality assurance" mechanism. Hospitals were required to perform autopsies on a certain proportion of decedents in order to maintain their accreditation. A classic study of 100 randomly selected autopsies from each of three years (1960, 1970, and 1980) revealed that major diagnoses had been missed in about 22 percent of cases in all three eras despite the introduction of modern imaging methods.

Unfortunately, autopsy rates have fallen from 25 percent to less than 5 percent over the past four decades. It never was a revenue producer for anyone except malpractice attorneys.

I always attended the autopsy if I could. One of my most important teachers was a patient in whom we had missed a condition that was glaringly obvious when the skull was opened. We might not have been able to save him, but since we hadn't even thought of the diagnosis, he didn't have a chance.

Tens of thousands of patients died of COVID before a series of 12 autopsies done in Germany showed that most had blood clots and could not have been saved by forcing air into their lungs with a ventilator.

If a person dies after a COV-ID jab, I would like to know whether there are spike proteins in the tissues and blood vessels, and whether there was an immunological reaction that was damaging those tissues. If a mother loses a baby, I would like to see a thorough examination of the placenta. Was the baby's oxygen and nutrition cut off because of damaged blood vessels?

I find it shocking that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), and the Joint Commission that accredits hospitals are not demanding autopsies or testing of vaccine samples. It is not possible to declare a product safe and effective without obtaining direct evidence from potential victims.

Manufacturers are protected against product liability, thanks to Congress. But where is the accountability of the government agencies charged with protecting us, or of the private entities coercing employees or students to take an experimental, potentially dangerous, or even lethal prod-

If someone you love dies unexpectedly, call the medical examiner, and demand a forensic autopsy.

# **Just Too Much Cash?**

A prolonged drop in U.S. Treasury yields is catching bond and fixed income traders as well as most investors by surprise. The 10-year U.S. Treasury yield dropped below 1.3% on July 7th and fell further overnight to 1.25% (despite real concerns about rising inflation and a gradual removal of Fed stimulus). Treasury yields play an important role in the economy, affecting borrowing costs on everything from mortgages to corporate

While interest rate declines have mystified many traders, the strong demand for yield is putting upward price pressure on equities, corporate bonds, and anything that reflects a potentially more worthwhile yield. However, yield spreads have collapsed. For the first time EVER iunk bonds vield less than the current inflation rate. Also, average stock market yields currently are higher than bond yields. It is getting harder and harder to find any significant yield in this market, but that continues to be very positive for the stock mar-

Here in the USA our money supply has exploded! Our government continues to come up with new excuses to create and distribute more cash. Our excessively high money supply is continually seeking yield, which puts significant upward price pressure on assets like real estate, bonds as well as equities. Historically the inflation hedge has been real estate and the capital markets, but how excessively expensive will those investments become?

A Wall Street colleague recently stated that his recommendation remains to buy growth

stocks with the best sales and earnings momentum. To me, that seems pretty basic. We are about to enter earnings season with the expectation of seeing some terrific earning announcements which will continue to fuel an already strong stock market.

Europe and Asia previously adopted Modern Monetary Theory which dictates the unlimited printing of currencies. It looks like the US has embraced that same theory! The USA currently has a \$30 Trillion budget deficit, and it is snowballing! The ultimate impact of such an ongoing direction in policy - continually printing more dollars - could easily create zero to negative interest rates (such as seen in European countries).

The USA's creation of money will make our enormous debt extremely hard to pay down. Visualize the problem when interest rates head higher. Interest on the Government debt already exceeds the entire US defense budget. Unfortunately, the current administration's only solution is to print more money! Does anyone believe that inflation will be transitory? Maybe some recent growth has been transitory, but don't bet on that either!

Most analysts had expected 10-year Treasury yields to hit

around 2% by this point in the COVID economic recovery, or at least by the end of 2021. In the first quarter alone, the yield soared to nearly 1.75% as the reflation trade took hold of the markets. But it looks like the move lower is now staying firmly in place. Longer-term yields are also a closely watched economic barometer, with the rates tending to fall on a weakening growth outlook and too much liquidity. It is getting harder and harder to find yield in this market, and stock market yields currently are higher than bond

The release of the July 7th FOMC minutes confirmed messages conveyed by Chair Powell in his June 16th press conference. There was general agreement the conditions for tapering (slowing) QE purchases have not been met, but likely will be. The conversation about when to start, and how to do it - particularly whether to taper MBS at the same pace as Treasuries - will be discussed at future meetings. There was even a discussion about the higher interest rate forecasts by members, thus advocating earlier tightening to emphasize the uncertainty of their forecasts.

So, what can we expect in the immediate future? Anticipate an accommodative Federal Reserve, strong corporate earnings, a strong capital market, and continued low interest rates. And yes, more inflation!

Can you help us figure out the real cost of being homeowners vs. continuing to rent?

When a "homeowner" pays their monthly mortgage loan payment, they are gaining equity by paying off their loan. When you pay rent, you are helping to pay off your landlord's mortgage. Get a basic answer to your question by using an online Rent vs. Own calculator. Keep in mind that homeownership comes with additional maintenance and repair costs. Contact an independent loan originator (FindAMortgageBroker.com) who will also make those calculations for you, explain the mortgage loan process, and shop many different loan programs on your behalf to find the best loan program for you. (Your bank loan originator is limited to the loans offered by that bank. Internet lenders sometimes quote great rates, but the fine print disqualifies most bor-

rowers.) Is there a way for us to set up some sort of an account for our

grandson? There are several investment accounts you could establish for your grandchild, but one that my clients fall in love with is a cashvalue life insurance policy. Starting while your grandson is young, and paying less than \$100 per month into a \$100,000 life insurance policy, the cash-value could be enough to pay for college or enough to put a sizeable down-payment on a house. If he waited even longer to access the cash value, he might have more than a million dollars for his re-

ning, what are the important ages, and why?

At age 59 ½, as long as certain conditions are met, you can start taking withdrawals from qualified retirement plans and IRAs without incurring a penalty. Since these have been growing tax-deferred, you'll now have to pay ordinary income taxes. At age 62, you could start collecting reduced Social Security benefits. Depending on what year you were born, you could take full Social Security benefits when you reach "full retirement age" (usually ranging from ages 65 to 67). At age 65, you're eligible to enroll in Medicare. (Enroll 3 months before turning 65.) Note: If you do not get Part D (prescription drug plan) when you are first eligible for SS, you will be charged a higher premium for the rest of your life. Besides the usual Medicare plans (PPO), also, look at the different Medicare "Advantage" plans. These are HMO, and usually offer additional benefits like dental, vision, and hearing. At age 72, you're mandated to take Required Minimum Distributions from tax-deferred retirement accounts. An online calculator can give you an idea of the amount required. It uses the total of your tax-deferred retirement accounts at that time, and a federal government life-expectancy chart.

What's a simple way to start

Start by looking at 3 months' worth of statements. Add up all your expenses and purchases (including ATM cash withdrawals). Divide by 12 any irregular bills (due quarterly, semi-annually, or annually) and add that amount to each of the 3 months. Add in money you anticipate spending for entertainment, vacations, and gifts. Finally, divide your 3month total by 3 to get the average you are spending each month. Reality check! If you don't earn the amount of money, you are going into debt. If you earn more than that, the extra should be put into paying off credit card debt, and adding to savings for emergencies, retirement, and general savings. If you are making just enough to get by, see where you can reduce your expenses or in-

### **Board Approves Barger Motion In** Support Of SB 219 To Waive **Property Tax Penalties Resulting** From Covid-19 Economic Hardships

LOSANGELES COUNTY— The Los Angeles County Board

of Supervisors unanimously approved a motion authored by Supervisor Kathryn Barger and coauthored by Supervisor Hilda So- the pandemic," shared Los Angelis to support SB 219 (McGuire) les County Board of Supervisors which would enable the local auditor or tax collector to cancel any penalties or costs resulting from property tax delinquency due to a documented hardship arising from the COVID-19 "Safer-at-Home" orders.

"The Safer-at-Home orders impacted every single resident and business throughout Los Angeles County, and it is imperative for the County to partner with the State to support our taxpayers who suffered financially," said Supervisor Kathryn Barger. "SB 219 is one opportunity to provide much-needed relief and assistance for those negatively affected by the COVID-19 pandemic."

"Support for SB 219 aligns with the County's approach to

ensuring an equitable recovery for all, especially among our hardest hit residents who are still reeling from the economic, social and psychological impacts of Chair, Hilda L. Solis. "The economic recovery of our residents is dependent on how well we support them, which is why I authored a motion last year with Supervisor Barger directing the Treasurer and Tax Collector to consider the impact of COVID-19 on delinquent property owners and cancel any late penalty. SB 219 reinforces our authority and empowers counties statewide to provide the same support to their residents who may face economic hardships brought on by COVID-19.'

If passed by the State Legislature, SB 219 would codify the County tax collector's ability to cancel tax delinquent penalties when failure to make the pay-

ment is due to a documented financial hardship arising from a shelter-in-place order, and if the principal amount of tax due is paid no later than June 30 of the fiscal year in which the payment first became delinquent. This bill would change the enforcement of late payment penalties to individuals who have been impacted through no fault of their own. SB 219 is supported by the California State Association of Counties, the Urban Counties of California, and the Rural County Representatives of California as a much-needed tool for County tax collectors that can maintain predictability of critical revenue support for local agencies. As a result of the board's action, Los Angeles County legislative advocates will actively support SB 219 for passage in Sacramento.

### "Time Jockey" - Alhambra Early Pioneers

Drawing... In the 1870's, westward migration was growing at a pace that not many people had expected. Only twenty years after statehood and the lure of gold, Americans in greater numbers saw California as a place to move to. Land was affordable, the weather was perfect and nearly any type of crop or agriculture product could be grown. California offered those who were interested in a new opportunity to start a new life and acquire things they never had before.

Benjamin Wilson and his son-in-law James de Barth Shorb starting selling housing development sites on their large acreage site southwest of Wilson's main property location. The site was known as the Alhambra Tract and Wilson-Shorb hoped to attract Americans who were educated and cultured and may be interested in purchasing some property not only for investment purposes but also for homesites.

Alhambra was just in its infancy and was nothing more than a subdivision of San Gabriel. The farmers of Alhambra purchased a half million-dollar worth of supplies and product from San Gabriel suppliers and were seeking to sell their own

supplies and products to fellow farmers within Alhambra. Among the first settlers in Alhambra was Mattie Wallace, along with her husband and three children. Wallace was the niece of Benjamin Wilson and was talked into moving west from Mississippi by Wilson himself, who allowed Wallace and her family to stay in one of his adobes near the Old Mill that had been established by the Mission nearly 50 years earlier.

Shortly thereafter Wallace purchased 10 acres of land from Governor George Stoneman and Wallace built his ranch home on the site. The site is on the southwest corner of Huntington Drive and Granada Avenue, and today is a condominium complex, just another continuum in the development lifecycle. The house was the first house built within the modern city boundary of Alhambra. Wallace was a jeweler and clock maker by trade but once he saw the large amounts of citrus produced by his neighbors, he opened a nursery, made more money than he ever realized, and continued the business for 40 years.

At the time, there was no railroad from the East into Los Angeles, the railroads were built

to get to Los Angeles one had to take a stagecoach or ride horseback. An excursion of potential railroad investors came to Los Angeles seeking an opportunity for investment. Among them was George B. Adams, Dr. T.D. Kellogg, Dr. Hayden, and Charles P. Browne. All of them decided to purchase property in the Alhambra Tract with Adams building the second house in the city, Dr. Kellogg became the first physician in the city and with Dr. Hayden tried to open the first hospital in Alhambra but it was destroyed by fire. Browne was the first carpenter in Alhambra and whenever a new building needed to be built it was Browne who got the call. Like every city in Southern California which started in the late 1800's, it took the right combination of people to build it from scratch and Alhambra's early beginning had that right combination to move it to the next step of city-

Three vaccines are now available in the United States: those made by Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson/Janssen Pharmaceuticals. All are safe and highly effective at preventing severe COVID-19 illness, hospitalizations and death.

3. Immunize your child. Now is the time to immunize your child, if they are eligible, so they are fully vaccinated by the start of school. It takes five weeks for the two-dose Pfizer vaccine to be fully effective. With schools reopening in person in August in many places, and with just one in five children between 12-15 years old vaccinated, you should start the vaccination process as soon as possible.





### Beach Trip Cut Short With Arrest | Man Caught on CCTV Slashing **Tires of Three Police Units**

**EL MONTE** - Police are looking for the man who slashed the tires of three El Monte police vehicles on July 10 in broad daylight, while they were handling a call.

With the 3 units out of service, it resulted in delays in police responses to a number of other calls, including a fight between several people and a domestic disturbance that ended in an arrest, according to El Monte police Chief David Reynoso.

The suspect, who wore a black shirt and light-colored jeans, punctured six tires with a large knife. He hit all 3 police unit who were on scene, two tires on each SUV unit. There was around \$2,000 damage done to the vehicles.

The police stated, "We're asking for the public's assistance to identify the person so it doesn't happen again."

Three officers responded to the 4000 block of Maxson Road in the afternoon of July 10 to make contact with someone suspected of possibly making threatening phone calls. This is when the suspect drove by and noticed

the 3 police units. He made a U-Turn and stopped by the units and got out with a knife and punctured the tires on each unit around 2:30 p.m. The crime was captured by a camera and put out over the media to help capture the suspect.

He drove a red Chevrolet El Camino with chrome type mag wheels with a sticker on the back window that reads, "TESTA-MENT" in green lettering.

## Monrovia High Speed Crash in Residential Area Kills Driver

The driver's identity was not released until the next of kin were notified.





Both suspects appeared dressed in light-colored clothing, had hoods over their heads and wore dark gloves. One suspect appeared to wear darkcolored shoes.


